

## DIVORCED MEN IN GREAT DANGER

Liable to Payment of Alimony So  
Long as Former Wives Live  
And Do Not Marry.

### SO RULES AN ILLINOIS JUDGE.

This Is So Though He May Have Re-  
married and Raised a Family and  
Become a Grandfather.

Chicago, May 11.—Divorced men have received a shock from Judge Parlin Q. Ball, that has caused not a few of them to seek the advice of lawyers. Although divorced 50 years and although no mention of alimony was made in the document, no divorced man, according to the decision of the judge, is safe from the payment of alimony as long as his former wife lives and fails to marry.

Judge Ball announced that, while a decree of divorce ended the other marital obligations the demand for such support was not ended. In other words a wife who obtained a divorce years ago, can hob up and discover her former spouse has become wealthy, and go into court and successfully demand her rights.

That is of course providing she has not married in the meantime and did not accept a stipulated alimony when she was divorced.

Even though the divorced husband has married again, become the father of 10 children, and may be even a grandfather, the former wife's right to alimony are not annulled in any way.

### HOW JUDGE INDUCES PRISONERS TO PLEAD GUILTY

Redding, Cal., May 11.—Judge John L. Cullis of the superior court of Del Norte county has an unique and effective system of disposing of the criminal cases in his jurisdiction at small expense to the county. It is his custom to visit the accused in their cells and induce them to plead guilty.

The judge explained his system yesterday as follows:

"I have considerable leisure, and when I hear that some alleged criminal is in the county jail, I make it a point to call on him and leave him a few papers. A day or two later I visit him again and perhaps leave him more papers. I repeat my visit at a seeming interval and perhaps sit down and talk to the offender in a friendly way. It usually turns out that by the time the district attorney is ready to file the information against the prisoner I have him in a frame of mind where he is ready to plead guilty."

"Seventeen accused men have pleaded guilty in Del Norte in the last two years through my ministrations. I find it takes less time to induce them to plead guilty than it does to try them in my court before a jury. I know that my method is very unusual among superior judges, and I may be criticized, but it works, and it pays."

### TOKIO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS REBEL

Tokio, May 11.—Fifteen hundred students of the commercial high school held the last mass meeting today at which resolutions were passed declaring that they would no longer attend the school. After the mass meeting the students formed a line in front of the building, sang the school song, hid away, removed their school insignia and then dispersed.

The trouble in the commercial high school commenced some time ago when the students petitioned the government to raise it to the rank of a university. Their request was not granted, but the minister of education sought to effect a compromise by establishing a new commercial college of law at the university of Tokio.

The trouble culminated last week in a fire which nearly destroyed the building. It was suspected that the fire was the work of the enraged students.

### KILLED BY AN AUTO.

Mother, Crazy With Grief, Attacked Motorman, Then Attempted Suicide.

New York, May 11.—In response to a message that their 3-year-old son had been run over and killed by a Second avenue trolley car at One Hundredth street, Mrs. Mary Altman ran to the scene and attacked the motorman and a street car company inspector, tearing part of their clothes from them. Two policemen took the frantic mother to her home and there she tried to commit suicide by stabbing herself with a bread knife. Her husband disarmed her before she could accomplish her purpose.

In the meantime the motorman had locked himself inside the car as a precaution against a crowd of more than 500 wildly excited persons who were trying to attack him. To rescue him the police reserves commanded a grocery wagon, backed it up to the car, hustled the motorman into it and drove him rapidly to the police station.

## TWO REPUBLICANS WHO LEAD FIGHT ON ALDRICH TARIFF



Senator Beveridge of Indiana has joined the faction hostile to the Aldrich bill on the Republican side of the senate and has called attention to the growing revolt in his party against the bill, which he professes to believe does not meet with the approval of the president or a large percentage of the Republican party. The attitude of Senator Dolliver, who voiced the sentiments of the tariff revisionists of his party a few days ago, is shared by Senators Nelson, Cummins and Elkins. Senator Beveridge, in entering the fight questioned the source of the finance committee's information upon which it based the schedules. He also announced that he would speak on the bill as a whole before the close of the session.

### CAPT. HOWELL NAMED AS SECY. NICHOLS' SUCCESSOR

Olympia, Wash., May 11.—Capt. J. M. Howell of Tacoma has been named as secretary of state by Gov. A. E. Hay to succeed Samuel H. Nichols, resigned. Gov. Hay stated that he had received the highest recommendations in regard to Mr. Howell and that he believes him eminently fitted for the post. Mr. Nichols tendered his resignation some days ago with the understanding that it is to take effect as soon as his successor is appointed and qualified. Letters have been sent to Mr. Nichols notifying him that his resignation had been accepted and to Mr. Howell notifying him of his appointment. Mr. Howell is expected in Olympia tomorrow.

### FAILED TO FIND CACHE ON COCOS ISLAND

San Francisco, May 11.—With no treasure trove, but with a hard luck story of a typhoon, and ship wrecked, Capt. James Brown, who claims that he is the only man in the world that knows where to find the Cocos Island cache of \$500,000, has returned from the antipodes.

Brown left this city Feb. 2, and March 5 left Sydney in a 25-ton schooner with a crew of four to search the south seas for the treasure. Two days later the boat was thrown upon a reef and wrecked. He and his crew were rescued by a French ship.

The aged seaman explained that in 1850, while chief mate of the schooner Sea Foam, his skipper, Capt. Henry Smith, confided to him that he had located the famous Peruvian treasure of gold, diamonds and money that had long been sought by adventurous treasure hunters. The booty was found and transferred to another island for safety. Through a series of mishaps all on board the Sea Foam, with the exception of Brown, died. The latter says he will make another effort to recover the buried riches. His home is in Providence, R. I.
