Henry Smith, confided to him that he had located the famous Peruvian treasure of gold, diamonds and money that had long been sought by adventurous treasure hunters. The booty was found and transferred to another island for safety. Through a series of mishaps all on board the Sea Foam, with the exception of Brown, died.
