FRANCE.
Italy Negotiating with Germany Will Recognize Alphonso.

PARIS, 8.—It is reported that Italy is negotiating with other powers to secure a common course of action in regard to Spain. Prince Hohenzollern, the German ambassador, has informed the Duke de Cases that Germany is prepared to recognize Alphonso as King of Spain.

Alphonso Recognized, Congratulated, &c.

Alphonso has granted an amnesty to all the Carlists.
The King of the Belgians has recognized Alphonso, and has telegraphed his congratulations. His recognition by most of the European cabinets is momentously expected. The blessing of the Pope, asked for by the King, has been sent through the Nuncio in this city. His Majesty will issue from this city, a decree convoking the Cortes. The staff of the Spanish embassy here have paid their homage and presented an address. The King, in reply, said he would not disguise the difficulties of his task, and he sought the aid of able men in all parties. His first wish was the pacification of Spain, and the desire to be the king of all Spaniards.

PRUSSIA.

Now Year's Congratulations.
BERLIN, 8.—The Emperor Wm., in reply to New Year congratulations, expressed gratification at the continuance of peace in Europe, which he said was the first duty of the German emperor to preserve.

TURKEY.

Dying of Famine.
CONSTANTINOPLE, 8.—Accounts from Asia Minor show that the distress from the famine is increasing, many deaths occurring daily.

ITALY.

Went Home a Pensioner.
ROME, 8.—Garibaldi has written a letter declining an offer of a pension for his relief, because of the condition of the Italian finances; he expresses his gratitude to parliament.

SPAIN.

Preparing for the King.
MADRID, 8.—A deputation, with the Marquis Molins, the new minister of the navy, at its head, has gone to Cartagena, where it will embark on the iron clad Numancia and proceed to Marseilles to bring King Alphonso to Spain. The king will land at Barcelona, and thence go to Valencia, where he will review the army of the center, and will then proceed to Madrid. The municipality of the capital are preparing to give the king a splendid reception.

BELGIUM.

Premature Report.
BRUSSELS, 8.—The report that the King of the Belgians had recognized the new king of Spain was premature, the king only telegraphed his personal congratulations to Alphonso.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Agreement Improbable—Entered France.
LONDON, 4.—Paris dispatches state that a conference of the leading members of the assembly and President McMahon was held at the Elysee last Saturday. The special note published concerning the proceedings, says that in response to the appeal of McMahon each party explained the reasons of their party being represented with perfect frankness. No further details of the meeting are given, but the note concludes with the hope that the conference will dispel misunderstandings and effect a reconciliation.

The Times' Paris correspondent telegraphs that the significance of the Assembly is willing to sacrifice its pretensions, for the impossibility of agreement is no longer denied. Other special correspondents make similar reports. It is said that upon the meeting of the Assembly, Balbo or Dufour will demand an immediate debate on the constitutional bill, or a dissolution of the house in the event of refusal.

Sereno entered France by way of Urdex, on Saturday; it is reported that he goes to Paris, and thence to Berlin.

"Crueler than Death."

A HUSBAND BEGGING FOR THE REMAINS OF HIS DEAD WIFE.

BERLIN, December 22.—To the Surgeons and Physicians of Northern Ohio:

GENTLEMEN—For as gentlemen and Christians I address you, craving your kind and considerate attention to my request. On the 18th of the present month my wife died of typhoid fever, and was buried on the 19th in Berlin, and on Tuesday and the following Saturday, was taken from her grave by some person or persons, and for what purpose I cannot conceive, unless for the purpose of dissection in some college or hospital. And more, gentlemen, as a husband and father of her little children, I ask you to send me the remains of my wife after they have served your purpose, that I at least may know where her ashes rest. Gentlemen, I will not try to pry into your secrets, I will not try to give you any trouble if you will put the remains in a box or case and send or leave it where I may get it. Gentlemen, for the sake of my motherless children grant my request and you will partially heal a wound that is crueler than death and as lasting as life.
