

DANISH WEST INDIES MIDDLE.
Denmark Proposes a Plan to End the Disputations.
CONGRESS MUST ACT SOON.

IF THIS IS NOT DONE, THE ISLANDS WILL BE BEYOND REACH OF THIS COUNTRY PLAN SUGGESTED.

(Early Dispatches.)

New York, May 15.—An article in the *Verden*, the organ of the Danish government in Copenhagen, states that Denmark is considering a plan to put an end to the Danish West India islands middle by placing the islands in the hands of a chartered company, which will conduct their affairs under the Danish flag, and thereby cutting off Germany as well as the United States from obtaining possession of the islands.

It is perfectly well understood in diplomatic circles in Washington, it is said, that unless Congress acts on the matter of the islands during this session, this government cannot become a purchaser. The chartered company is supposed to be a Danish company, and the Danish government is calling on Congress to ratify publicly the agreement already privately entered into.

From the time the sale of the islands was mooted, prominent business men have contended that the sale should not take place. They offered to show that the islands could be made profitable, and that they were worth the price at any time after the present negotiations were off take the place of the government in a measure and prove their assertions. According to *Verden*, a meeting of the promoters was called and well understood was the government's attitude that many of the details of the plan were at once worked out.

According to the newspaper in question it was understood by the promoters from the start that it would be necessary to reform the enormously expensive administration of the islands and wipe out the old monopolies. "During the past few days," the article says, "positive guarantees with regard to these matters have been received from the government."

These are the company will practically take over the government, and control of the islands, subject to the supervision of the Danish government, and that the old high paid officials who did nothing but draw their pay would lose their sinecures.

The first plan is to start a national bank at St. Thomas, to which the government has already given private control. At the present time there is a bank of the island, but it is not a bank of the island, but a bank of the United States. This is on account of the high tariff rates between the islands. The exports from St. Thomas to St. Croix from 1897 to 1898 amounted to \$1,400,000, and from St. Croix to St. Thomas \$400,000.

A steamship line between the islands and the United States will be maintained. At the beginning it will be exclusively by the way of New Orleans, and later it will be extended directly to this port. Coal stations will be erected at St. Thomas and there will be no coal dealer there at the present time, and it is asserted that he has left the trade by his arbitrary measures. The coal stations will be erected at a considerable distance so that water can be piped directly to the ships in the docks. The present company owned 45,000 crowns last year out of this money.

Almost the first thing the new company will do will be to erect several modern hotels. A modern steam laundry will also be built. Heretofore all washing was done on the coast in a primitive manner. It is pointed out that laundry work is a very lucrative business in the tropics, the establishments in Singapore and Aden having made fortunes for their promoters. Warehouses will be built and also a factory where sugar barrels can be manufactured. The needs of the islands will be raised and large banana and pine apple groves planted.

HOW MUCH, AND HOW MADE

Government Gives Out Data Regarding Oleomargarine.

Over 91,000,000 Pounds Made in One Year—Nearly 12,000,000 in One Month.

Washington, May 15.—Secretary Gage today sent to the speaker in reply to the House resolution of May 8th, directing him to furnish the House "the monthly duplicates of pages one and two of form 216 of the internal revenue department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, as returned by the various manufacturers of oleomargarine throughout the United States for the above periods," the following report of the commissioner of internal revenue to whom the resolution was referred:

Treasury department, office of the commissioner of internal revenue, Washington, D. C., May 14, 1900:

To the Hon. Secretary of the Treasury: In compliance with your instructions in response to House resolution of May 8, 1899, I have the honor to submit herewith data called for. The original forms in which this information is submitted to this office are not only very large in bulk but voluminous in number, and cannot very well be transmitted. They are part of the records in the custody of the treasury department.

The data submitted discloses the kinds of material used, the amount of each ingredient and the per cent of each ingredient in the total amount of oleomargarine produced in the country for the periods named, and it is believed that the information intended to be called for in the resolution. 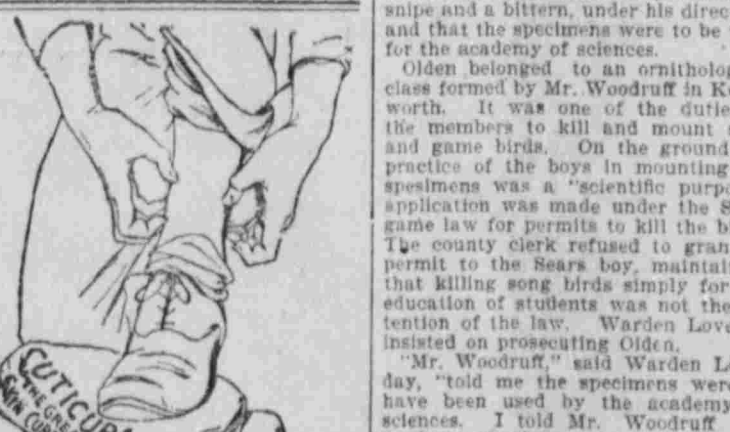

TEMPERATURE UP AND DOWN.

Was Very Warm, Followed by Light Frosts with No Damage.

SOME GOOD SHOWERS FELL.

All Crops Made Rapid Growth—Sugar Beets Coming Up Nicely—Winter Wheat is Fine.

Salt Lake City, May 15, 1900.—The mean temperature of the week ending May 14th was from two to four degrees above normal. The first part of the week was unusually warm, the maximum temperatures in most localities, ranging between 80 and 90 degrees. A decided drop in temperature occurred on the 11th and 12th, and the latter half of the week was quite cool. In some localities in the southern portion of the State, light frosts occurred, but did no damage. During the latter portion of the week, good showers fell in the north tier of counties and light showers over the rest of the State. High, drying southerly winds commenced on the night of the 10th and continued until the 12th. All crops made rapid growth during the warm weather. Sugar beets are generally coming up nicely. Corn and potato planting is well in progress. Winter wheat is in excellent condition. In Washington county wheat and barley are in head and lucern in bloom. A large crop of fruit seems assured.
