





The statistical report submitted yesterday by Sheriff Joseph Bailey to the board of county commissioners cover-ing the work of the sheriff's office for the past two years is interesting reading, particularly as regards the amount of business with the criminal element which has been present in the county for the past few years owing to the great amount of railroad work going Some of the figures taken from the

During that period 31 criminals have een sent to the penitentlary for terms ranging from one to eleven years, the imes for which they were committed being robbery, burglary, grand larceny and forgery. Fourteen persons were sent to the state mental hospital and ine were committed to the state industrial school. Sentences were served in the county fail by eight prisoners for periods ranging from 10 days to five months. The number of prisoners awaiting trial is 15, and the crimes include almost every one in the calendar. Four prisoners were arrested for ofinces in other states and seven were brought back from other states. A large amount of property and live-stock were recovered. The number of

stock were recovered. The number of civil papers served was 624, for which fees were received arkounting to \$442.67. Fees amounting to \$2,146.20 were col-lected for serving \$32 papers in criminal The number of jurors served and excused was 946; the number of notices of stolen property sent out 3.000, and the number of descriptions of criminals
