vaccinated, and be it further "Resolved, That it is not to the best interests of the board of education that any such inquiry should be made by the teachers or the principals of the chools and that in case such duties are imposed upon principals or teachers of the schools they could only perform such duties imperfectly and such action would work great hardships upon and injure the successful management of the schools of the City of Salt Lake, and be it further "Resolved. That the superintendent

and the health officer of the board of education and all principals and teach-ers govern themselves accordingly and that the board of education will de-fend all such employes on account of their action in accordance with this resolution, and be it further "Resolved, That the superintendent
