

extend the pipes through the cemetery grounds in strictly in keeping therewith and not at all a new idea.

The cemetery has waited nearly forty years for its supply and consequently its claim altogether antedates all others that are now made against it.

I have no ax to grind in this matter, as I live in an old settled locality where prior water rights prevail. I have seven dead lying in a cemetery lot, however, whose graves I would like to decorate with a living green sward as well as a little shrubbery and a few flowers, but not at the expense of a solitary living person. I have as strong a desire as any one to see our water supply made ample for all, and have used my influence in this direction for many years past, but in the meantime let us be willing to divide with each other, not forgetting the resting places of the dead. One of our late Presidents, G. A. Smith, in speaking of our barren cemetery to the writer, at one time remarked, "When I die I would at least like one tree under whose shade I could rest if I should ever want to visit my tomb." He has been dead nearly twelve years but that tree is not yet planted for the reason that no water can be had to keep it alive.

In a late Epistle of the First Presidency it was recommended that the burial places of our dead should not be neglected. We clothe our dead in appropriate habiliments and are very particular to have them properly placed upon their bodies; these, with their bodies, decay and go back to their native element, but the earth under which they lie should be clothed in an evergreen which is emblematic of eternal life; therefore I say divide with us and let us have for this purpose a little WATER.

Emery County Notes.—Mr. Wm. Howard, of Huntington, Emery County, sends the following, under date of April 4th:

We have had a very dry, warm winter, which has enabled us to get our canals and ditches in running order a month earlier than usual.

The farmers have been putting in crops for the last six weeks, and if we do not have a storm soon, the grain will have to be watered up.

A year ago, Huntington spent about \$1,200 in fruit trees, mostly from the Geneva Nurseries, which as a general thing, have done well. Although their trees are small, yet they have splendid roots, with plenty of small fibres, which cause the tree to grow very rapidly when set out. Some that I bought from this firm last year sent forth new limbs over three feet long last season. Mr. Geo. Ipsom of this place also bought in a large lot of fruit trees from the Woodbury nurseries, but the great trouble with them was they did not have root. As a consequence, a great many of them died. Most of us feel well to think we have got splendid orchards started.

The people of Cleveland (which is destined to be a large settlement), about six miles northeast of Huntington, are now very busy on their canal. They expect to get water out soon enough this spring to raise crops this coming summer. A great many of the shareholders of the canal are Pleasant Valley coal miners, who have taken up land and made some improvements on it, in most cases enough to fill the law, but who have to go back to the mines to earn means to support themselves and families. On account of no water being within six or seven miles of their land, they can as yet do no farming.

The health of the people generally is good.

James Lee shot his wife five times at a ranch on Elk River, near Eureka, Nevada, on the 25th ult. She had sued for a divorce.

Cache Valley Items.—From the Logan Journal of April 6th:

Mrs. Barnabus Lake, a lady 57 years of age, was thrown from a sleigh at Fairview, near Preston Ward, Idaho, about five weeks ago. Her wrist was put out of joint and her side much injured. It is thought that some of her ribs are broken. On Monday last Dr. Ormsby was sent for to attend her injuries. He went and found the old lady in a distressing situation. He did what he could to relieve her sufferings, and left her more comfortable than when he found her.

On last Sunday afternoon Jas. Mrs. Junius S. Fulmer was going home in a wagon, the team of which was driven by a little boy, a buggy behind the Edwards stallion, driven by a young man, ran into the hind wheel of the wagon, throwing the box forward and tipping the lady out into the road. The fall bruised her considerably, and hurt her shoulder severely. The team became frightened and ran with speed down the road, knocking over a little boy, a son of Severin Jeppesen, injuring his forehead and nose quite badly. Doctor Ormsby attended their injuries and at last accounts both were getting along very well.

WOOD.—At residence in this city, at 11:30 p.m. yesterday, of puerperal fever, Elizabeth Wood, wife of William Wood, aged 41 years in October last.

GREENALGH.—At Pleasant Grove, Utah County, March 9, 1887, Henry Greenalgh, aged 68 years. Deceased was born in Bolton, Leicestershire, Lancashire, England, February 26th, 1819; baptized in 1841, emigrated to Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1861; came to Utah in 1866; settled in Pleasant Grove, where he has ever since resided. He was highly esteemed for his honesty, integrity and many sterling qualities. He died in full faith of the Gospel.

ROGERS.—At Benson, Cache County, U. T., at one o'clock a.m., March 25th, 1887, of typhoid pneumonia, Rebecca Jane, daughter of John and Rebecca Williams, and the beloved wife of Henry T. Rogers.

Deceased was born Nov. 22nd, 1830, at Wellsville, Cache County, Utah; moved to Tooele City when five years of age; shortly after, her father died; moved to Benson, Cache County, with her mother in 1881; was married in January, 1885, to H. T. Rogers, with whom she lived happily till her death. Sister Rogers was a kind and affectionate wife and loving mother and was highly esteemed by all who knew her.—Com.

TIDWELL.—John Tidwell, Sen., died at his residence in Mount Pleasant, Sanpete County, January 24th, 1887, of old age. Deceased was born in Shelby County, Kentucky, on the 14th of January 1807. The family afterwards, in 1813, moved to Indiana, where he, in the year 1823, married Jane Smith. On the 25th of September, 1835, he was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and gathered with the Saints at Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1839; he was ordained a Seventy 1844. He left Nauvoo with the Saints in 1846, resided at Kanesville for some time, arrived with his family in Salt Lake Valley September, 1852, and settled afterwards in Pleasant Grove, Utah County. There he was ordained President of the 24th Quorum of Seventies, which position he held till his death. In June, 1859, he moved with his family to Mount Pleasant, Sanpete County, where he has since resided. He leaves a wife and eight children, sixty-seven grand children, and thirty-seven great grand children. He lived and died a consistent Latter-day Saint. His funeral took place from the meeting-house on January 26th.—Com.

FREESTONE.—At Coalville, Summit County, Utah, January 20, 1887, William Freestone. He was born at Leicester, England, Oct. 29, 1824. Moved to Chitwick when 12 years of age; was baptized in 1845 by Elder Thos. Woodruff; was President of the branch at Chitwick for 19 years and subsequently for 14 years; emigrated in 1862; was ordained a High Priest by President W. W. Cluff in 1864. He died as he had lived, in the full faith of the Gospel.
