## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRE TO-MORROW NIGHT.**—Remember the benefit of Miss A. Adams, at the Theatre to-morrow evening. **WHERE ONE RECOVERED FROM ILLNESS.**—Mr. R. H. Hensford, interpreter for the Bannack Indians, sends information to U. S. Marshal Wheeler, of Montana, regarding the recovery of a white girl from Indian captivity. As the publication of the communication may tend to the restoration of the little wanderer to her relatives, we herewith insert it as it appeared in the Helena, M., Gazette:

**FT. PARKER, January 6th, 1871.**  
W. F. WHEELER, U. S. Marshal:

Dear Sir:—I went to-day to the Bannack camp with two men by the name of Clifford K. and Thomas Childer, that Col. W. W. the Indian Agent at Wind River, sent up here to get a little girl that they think is the same who was captured in 1826. Both living, by the Bannack. I succeeded in finding her, and have her here in my room, and they will start back in a few days with her. Her name is McIntyre, Gen. W. may know something about the matter. She is about fourteen years of age, I think, but small of her age; she is quite fair, and her hair is light; she is much smarter than I give her the appearance of being a quarter breed, which the Indians claim she is. I had no trouble with the Indians, in getting them to give her up, and she was willing to come and go back to the Wind River Agency. When I spoke to Tim Day and Tague, the Chiefs, they were surprised, but after I explained the matter to them, they said it was all right, if I said so; they had known me a long time, and had never lied to me, and whatever I said was straight and good.

A case of unusual interest was tried at Aurora, Illinois. One McGowan, an old resident of the town, was snatched by persons during the night, and in secure immunity from such disturbances, placed a spring gun over his gate. The result was that this man, a young lad, daughter of J. M. Addy, was shot and killed. The husband of one of the young ladies now lives in Chicago for \$10,000, the latter having been indicted for assault with a deadly weapon. Mr. Addyman has filed a similar suit.
