TAX VALUES OF WEBER COUNTY

Increase More Than a Million Over Last Year—Tabulated Figures.

BARBERS RESIST LICENSE FEE

Claim Same is Class Legislation and Therefore Unconstitutional—Section Hand Hit by Engine.

Ogden, July 11.—The assessed value of all property in Weber county for last year upwards of a million dollars, according to a tabulated list prepared by County Clerk David Mattison, who, with a corps of busy clerks, is extending the tax rolls. The report shows the following items of livestock in the county: Horses, 5,000; cattle, 10,000; sheep and goats, 20,000; swine, 1,700; colonies of bees, 600.

The valuation of all property in the county having passed the fifteen-million dollar mark, makes Weber county the only second class county in Utah.

BARBERS RESIST LICENSE FEE.

Held That State Barber Law is Unconstitutional.

Ogden, July 11.—On July 1 the state license of all the barbers in Ogden became due, and they have been notified from the state board of examiners that the annual renewal fee of \$1 is due and must be paid, otherwise their license would be revoked. There are 32 licensed barbers in Ogden now, and they have combined, agreeing not to pay the state fee and to fight the proposition in the courts if necessary, having engaged Judge W. L. Magnin to look after the interests.

The law of the state provides that any person desiring to practice barbering in the state must pass a satisfactory examination before an examining board, after which they pay a fee of \$5 for a state license, which is renewable every year on the payment of \$1. It is on the payment of this annual fee that the local barbers, 32 in number, make their objection. It appears that the law only provides for the payment of this fee in Ogden, Salt

Lake, Provo and Logan, the larger cities of the state, and those following the profession in other places are only expected to pass the state examination. It is the opinion of prominent lawyers of Ogden, that the law is unconstitutional, as it is not uniform as to all parts of the state, and the barbers propose testing the constitutionality of this law. Whether or not the barbers of Salt Lake and other cities concerned will join the local union in the fight is not yet fully determined, but it is very probable they will.

HIT BY ENGINE.

Thomas Blackmore, a Section Man, Severely Injured.

Ogden, July 11.—Thomas Blackmore, a section hand employed in the Union depot yards in this city, was struck by a switch engine yesterday afternoon and quite severely injured. Mr. Blackmore was working on the track spiking down rails when a Union Pacific switch engine was run down the track on which he was working. Whether or not the engineer on the engine signalled by ringing the bell or blowing the whistle is not certain; at any rate Blackmore did not hear the engine approaching and was struck in the back, knocking him several feet. He was picked up by his fellow workmen and removed to the hospital for medical attention. Dr. Joyce, the company's physician, attended him. He found that he had received quite painful injuries to his back and hips, although no bones were broken, and he will be laid up for some time. Blackmore has only been in Ogden about two months, coming here from Ireland. He is about 47 years of age and has a wife and children living here.
