

TROOPS SURROUND CHIEF CRAZY SNAKE

Hundreds of Militiamen, Cowboys And Deputy Sheriffs Are Closing in on Him.

INDIANS MEET WITH DEFEAT.

One Killed, Eight Captured—Several Families Leave Their Homes on Account of Present Troubles.

Oklahoma City, Okla., March 29.—Chief Harjo (Crazy Snake) was surrounded at midnight in the North Canadian bottoms, near Pierce. Three hundred militiamen, cowboys and deputy sheriffs were closing in upon him and his capture was expected at daybreak.

A LIVELY FIGHT.

Oklahoma City, Okla., March 29.—A detachment of Crazy Snake's band of hostile Indians was surrounded by deputy sheriffs this afternoon near Crazy Snake's home and a lively battle ensued. More than 200 shots were fired and one Indian was killed. Eight Indians were captured and the rest fled with the deputies in pursuit. There were about 15 Indians in the band that had taken refuge in a house. Deputies had tracked them for some distance and were informed by a farmer of their location.

CRAZY SNAKE'S BAND.

Crazy Snake's band apparently has broken up into numerous small groups. It seemed at nightfall that each was trying to accomplish his own escape without regard for the grand strategy of the campaign to realize which they were called together Sunday by the smoke of signal fires. All effort at organized resistance seemed to have been dropped with the sinking of the sun.

The militiamen seemed well able to cope with this latest phase of the situation, however, which became evident late this afternoon. They invaded the hills and wooded districts of the Creek nation in a determined effort to hunt down the war party. The wisdom of their policy at this early hour of the day for a C. O. knight thought they had captured eight prominent members of Crazy Snake's forces, including Little Tiger, a subchief.

PRISONERS OF WAR.

The captives were started for the camp at Hickory Grounds under heavy guard. Orders were issued that the search be kept up, and numerous parties went out during the early hours of the night to round up the renegades. As fast as they are captured they will be hurried to Hickory Grounds, where a re-concentration camp will be established. This morning the military authorities expected to avoid a pitched battle, but regarded it as certain that numerous smaller engagements would be fought.

The Indian killed by the posse was the only fatality of the day reported to Col. Hoffman. There are numerous rumors of engagements here and there, with varying numbers of fatalities. It is reported that a posse of farmers near Checotah fought a large band of negro renegades and killed 20. This, with similar reports, cannot be confirmed. A very disquieting condition exists throughout the troubled district, however, and almost anything in the way of a fight would not be surprising.

This gave rise to a story that the leader was killed. No confirmation of this could be obtained and it probably is incorrect, as nobody could be found tonight who had seen Crazy Snake during the day.

At the time prepared to enter upon the activities of the night, it was thought that the chief had carried out his intention of seeking refuge in the Hickory hills, and that he was supported there by some of his leaders.

Hickory Grounds was burned today by Indians to divert attention from the bushwhacking fight nearby, in which the Indians were killed. This was related by Deputy Jones and Frank Smith, after they reached Checotah tonight, for more ammunition. A detachment of deputies this evening captured Harjo, a half-breed, who, for a long time, has been one of Crazy Snake's aides. Sheriff Odum believes he was one of those in the Snake's house during Thursday evening's fight.

Deputy Flynn took Tabby to the Okmulgee jail, after passing part of the day with the militia. He said bloodhounds had been placed on the Snake's trail and that the chances were favorable for his capture within 24 hours.

"These negroes and Indians are not afraid of blackouts," said Flynn. "They know no fear as long as they stand their ground, and it was wise generalship to surround them. I regret to say that the situation is more critical than it appears on the surface. The visitor goes over the country and sees no excitement and concludes there is no danger, but the people who live here know better. Though the trouble has consisted principally of skirmishes, the lives of many people are continually endangered."

Several families have deserted their homes in the vicinity of Pierce on account of Indian troubles. Tremendous and fearless, the Redskins hang about that region, hiding at the woods and hills, and occasionally coming into the open.

Capt. Frank King of the engineering corps of the national guard, and Sgt. Fred Jones, are harrying the Indians in response to a call from Col. Roy Hoffman, who is in command of the men in the field.

Fearing that the skinheads near Hickory Grounds and the burning of Harjo's home may cause the Indians to leave their hiding places on the North Canadian river tonight and set fire to other houses, 150 men, heavily armed, planned to leave Checotah at 11 o'clock tonight for Pierce. The posse was organized by Deputy Sheriff William Clark.

TALES OF THE BATTLE.

Relating his experiences in the fight, Deputy Clark said:

"Our posse overtook a party of Indians near Pierce at 1:30 this morning in the North Canadian bottoms. We chased them for a mile and a half and they escaped into the Checotah mountains. We then returned to Pierce and stationed our pickets within 200 yards of Harjo's house. At 12:30 the Indians returned and fired on the pickets. During the battle the house of Harjo was fired. The smoke soon became so dense that we could not see where to fire and we retreated. Then, remembering that a detachment of militia had been reported in that part of the country, we feared that they might take us for Indians and fired at us. We were then surrounded until the smoke had cleared away, and then made another dash for the Indians. They had again escaped to the mountains, and we arrested two Indians. They would not talk, and we released them. None of our men were wounded."

"There is danger of the Indians returning to fire on the whites. They are badly enraged and the mountains, fire the houses and retire before officers can get to them. Some of our men have gone to McAlester after bloodhounds and will meet us at Pierce before morning. We are going to clean up this band of Indians and negroes if it takes us three months."

GENERAL DECADE ON TARIFF BILL

James of Kentucky Asserted Payne Measure Goes a Step Further in Pillaging.

REP. CUSHMAN DEFENDS IT.

Pleading for Better Protection to American Lumber and for a Duty on Coal.

Washington, March 29.—A probable will be the last week of general debate on the Payne tariff bill was begun in the house today.

Declaring that the Payne bill "rose one step further in the pillaging of humanity," Mr. James of Kentucky asked, "What is a reasonable profit?" that the Republicans claim the measure would allow.

"Who shall decide?" he asked. "Shall it be left to Andrew Carnegie, pricked by a conscience that has allowed him to loot for many years?" Mr. Carnegie, he said, commenced to establish in the various cities and towns of the country libraries where hungry, ragged men and boys of feeble mind could find food and comfort. They could not attend school, but they could find food and comfort.

PROTECTION OF LUMBER.

Mr. Cushman of Washington, the new Republican member of the committee on ways and means, plead for better protection to American lumber and for a duty on coal. The Democrats, he said, had characterized the bill as ill-considered, but they were not so ill-considered as to ignore the facts. He did not condemn it as a whole. It would be, he declared, an interesting contribution to the political literature in the nation to have printed and bound the bill in a book, exactly what the Democrats proposed as a substitute for the Payne bill.

Mr. Cushman's declaration that the conditions of the lumber trade in this country were under Democratic rule was disputed by Mr. Welles of Wisconsin. Mr. Welles declared that in the last 15 months 40 per cent of the lumber men of the country had been driven out of business, and that there had been failures to the amount of \$850,000,000 in the last two years.

Mr. Cushman replied that laboring men were not only getting the benefit of the tariff, but were well paid, and he said, was not the case when Democracy was in power.

Mr. Cushman got vociferous applause when he said "The lumber man has traveled a mighty distance since you and your party were in," addressing himself to Mr. Wilson of Pennsylvania, who had interrupted him.

"The lumber man," he continued, "has traveled all the way from a dime's worth of live on credit to a dollar's worth of port-horror on cash, and that represents a mighty and unmeasured distance in the history of domestic economy and national prosperity. It was, he said, the wage scale and not the price list that was the barometer of American prosperity."

Mr. Cushman declared free coal was not a Republican doctrine. He quoted from some remarks made by Mr. Payne when a bill was up providing for free coal, and said it did not lie with Mr. Payne to criticize him because he said, "I raised my hand today to a tariff on coal. I am preaching the doctrine which he himself taught me."

Mr. Cushman referred to the increase in the value of farm and other products of duty on raw materials. It was, he said, the wage scale and not the price list that was the barometer of American prosperity.

Mr. Cushman entered upon a eulogistic defense of the tariff, when he said the minds of the public were inflamed against the lumber manufacturers. "I say to you, however, you are seeing the wind and you will some day reap the whirlwind. Some day a spasm of popular reform will attack your particular industry and then the seeds of discord and malice which you have sown will spring up like the crop that grew from the dragon's teeth."

Mr. Cushman spoke for two hours and fifteen minutes, and received an ovation when he sat down.

Mr. Kennedy of Ohio spoke for an hour.

Claiming that the provisions of the Dingley bill for the free entry of material entering into the construction and repair of vessels built in America to be employed in a general trade have not increased the American merchant marine, Mr. Jones (Virginia) opposed re-enacting the provisions. He charged that a clause in the present law, declaring that vessels receiving the benefit of the act shall not engage in coastwise trade of the United States for more than two months in any one year, without paying the government the remitted duties, was the reason why no American shipyards are constructing ocean vessels out of free imported materials.

Mr. Scott (Kansas) declared lumber should be put upon the free list, and that the duty on hides ought to be restored. Mr. Scott argued that the rate of duty on zinc ore as carried in the Payne bill, taken in conjunction with the duty on spelter, inevitably would close the Kansas smelters.

SUGAR SCHEDULE.

Mr. Dickema (Michigan) discussed the sugar schedule. He said that if protection is withdrawn the sugar industry will be ruined. He argued against the proposed amendment, which would free 300,000 tons of sugar from the Philippines.

Mr. Hamer (Idaho) made a strong plea for the retention of the present duty on lead, opposed the free entry of Philippine sugar and deprecated the cry of trusts. He declared the proposed provision to permit the entry of Philippine sugar at a rate of 200,000 tons of sugar established a bad precedent, and declared that the proposed tariff reform may mean free trade in the future.

Mr. Hamer said, would be a concession to a sort of so-called political philosophy, but not mean a dollar in reduction to the consumer. In advocacy of the continued protection for lead, Mr. Hamer said:

"The most formidable competitor we have in the production of lead, because of accessibility, including cheapness of transportation to our markets, the abundance and low cost of labor and the universally known value of silver contents in the ore, is Mexico. I do not think it exaggeration to say that Mexico has a richer lead ore deposit than the United States has in the world."

At the present time, the lead mines of that country, owned and controlled by a single American corporation, are producing a net loss of one month's production of lead for every month in excess of our own."

"That the cost of production in the United States is increasing each year, and that it would soon be impossible to produce lead in this country without the aid of a protective tariff, were conceded by Mr. Hamer. He argued that the duty on lead was essential to the protection of the American smelting and refining company reduced only to
