

MAN'S INHUMANITY TO WOMANKIND

Delegate to Humane Society Convention Calls Them Barbarians and Murderers.

THEN CAME A FLOOD OF TEARS

J. Howard Moore Was the "Brute" Who Made the Assault on Wearing Feathers and Furs.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—Tears and hysterical denials on the part of the women delegates, who had heard themselves called "barbarians and murderers," marked the close of the convention of the American Humane association last night. The women for half an hour had listened patiently while a speaker denounced the wearing of furs and bird carcasses, for adornment of such character was evident in all parts of the hall. Apparently unable to listen further, two women finally left the convention hall. Another burst into tears, while the husband of a fourth arose to his feet in the defense of the women who wore furs. It was the address of J. Howard Moore on "The Cost of a Skin," that caused the stir-up. "Nobody but a barbarian would adorn her head with the carcass of a bird or the heads of grinning weasels," said Mr. Moore, "such things appeal only to the vulgar. Such a woman is about as attractive as a dog adorned with a string of skulls, for she is a murderer. Furs are the most costly of luxuries because to secure them men must be the most conscientious and inhuman." "When I think that in this day of advanced civilization and supposed refinement, brutalities such as are necessary to secure the furs of these little animals are practiced, I am heartily ashamed of the race to which I belong."

Dr. W. O. Stillman was elected president; Mrs. Mary F. Lovell of Pennsylvania, secretary, and James M. Brown of Toledo, vice president.

DELICIOUS STRONG BOX.

Surrogate Fitzgerald Signs Order for Opening It.

New York, Nov. 15.—Surrogate Fitzgerald signed an order yesterday permitting Flamm B. Candler, attorney for Charles M. Oelrichs, executor of Hermann Oelrichs' estate, to open a strong box taken from the state room in the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, on which Mr. Oelrichs died.

In his application to the court, Mr. Candler said there might be a recent will or codicil to that died with the surrogate which would provide for Mr. Oelrichs' widow and son. The order directs him to open the box in the presence of the representatives of Mr. Oelrichs and Hermann Oelrichs, Jr. If anything bearing on the administration of the estate is found, it is to be immediately filed with the surrogate.

It is said that if no later will is found, Mrs. Oelrichs will not pursue her opposition to the probating of the will now on file. It will be a surprise to the executor if any will or anything of much value is found in the box.

PROPOSED EXPORT DUTY ON MEXICAN SILVER COIN.

City of Mexico, Nov. 15.—Socoy of Finance Linantour has submitted to congress the draft of a proposed law, which, if it becomes effective, will establish an export duty of 10 per cent on Mexican silver coin. It is believed the law will be acted upon favorably by congress. It is claimed that the law is designed to keep silver of the old coinage at home while at the same time granting the merchant the profit he would gain by exportation at the present price of silver by handing over the dollars of the old coinage to the exchange and currency commission and receiving gold therefor.

For some time considerable apprehension has been felt in government and financial circles because of the outflow of silver from this country. Although the monetary commission declares the situation has been greatly

MRS. LUCRETIA J. TILTON'S WILL.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—The will of Mrs. Lucretia J. Tilton, who died recently, was filed for probate yesterday. Mrs. Tilton was the widow of Lucian Tilton who died in Chicago in 1877. Mrs. Tilton's estate is valued at \$265,000, of which a great share is left to various charitable institutions. To Booker T. Washington's work at Tuskegee, Ala., is given \$20,000. The Elliott City hospital at Keene,

is given \$6,000. The invalids' home at Keene, \$5,000.

Among other legacies are: The Hampton normal school and agricultural institute, at Hampton, and the American Unitarian association at Boston, Mass.

CASTRO NOT SERIOUSLY ILL.

New York, Nov. 15.—Charles B. Figueiredo, consul general of Venezuela, sent the following statement to the newspapers regarding the reported illness of President Castro: "Just received official cable from my government authorizing me to

deny published rumors regarding serious illness of Gen. Cipriano Castro, who is in full charge of his official duties."

RUSSIAN OFFICERS ARRESTED.

Kieff, Nov. 15.—The existence of a revolutionary organization in the army was made known today by the arrest of four officers of engineers, one officer of infantry and two reserve lieutenants who had attended a secret meeting of the organization held here today.

Mrs. Alice Phelps of Kansas City told of her efforts to release her two daughters from the influence of the society. Until six years ago, when they went to Shiloh, the two young women were teachers in Kansas City schools. One of them is now an inmate of the Maine insane asylum. Mrs. Phelps said that one day while she was at Shiloh trying to induce her daughters to leave, she expressed her disbelief in the claim that Sanford is a reincarnation of the prophet Elijah.

For this skepticism, she said, she was told that if she said such things about Sanford and the other apostles she would be struck down by the hand of God, as Shiloh was declared to be holy ground.

JAP BATTLESHIP LAUNCHED.

Tokio, Nov. 15.—The first-class Japanese battleship Satsuma, 19,000 tons, the first battleship to be launched in Japanese waters, took the water today in the presence of the emperor. The greatest enthusiasm was manifested. The newspapers here reflect the epoch making nature of the event, as indicating the progress of the development of the emperor and eulogize the success of the naval constructors. It is taken for granted that the Satsuma is the equal to, and perhaps the superior of anything afloat.

BRAZILIAN AMBASSADOR SUBJECTED TO INDIGNITY.

New York, Nov. 15.—Whether or not the ambassador of a friendly nation on arriving at an American port to take up his duties in Washington must be compelled to inform the immigration inspector whether he has ever been in prison, an almshouse or an insane asylum, or supported by charity, or whether he is a polygamist, or an anarchist, may be referred to the state department at Washington as a result of the refusal today of Joaquim Nabuco, Brazilian ambassador, to answer these questions, when he arrived here today from Liverpool.

The purser of the Baltic reported to the immigration inspectors that his manifest was incomplete owing to the ambassador's refusal.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Upon being unofficially informed of the circumstances attending the landing of the Brazilian ambassador, Senor Nabuco, in New York harbor, Secy. Root promptly communicated with the department of commerce and labor, and requested that the necessary instructions be telegraphed to the collector at New York to immediately extend the courtesy of the port to the ambassador and his secretary.

It is probable that an apology will be offered to the ambassador and a severe admonition given to the immigration officials responsible for the indignity.

CUTS SON OFF.

Millionaire Eben Smith Leaves Him \$25,000.

Denver, Nov. 15.—The will of the late Eben Smith of Los Angeles, disposing of upwards of \$2,500,000, filed today in the probate court, shows that one of his sons, Lemuel E. Smith of Leadville, has been cut off with the life income from \$25,000, set aside as a trust fund.

The estate is practically divided between the widow, Emily Lorne Smith, who receives one-half, and the other two children, Frank LeRoy Smith and Cora Isabel Carnahan, each of whom receives one-fourth. These children are named as executors.

EARLE TO RUN FOR MAYOR.

Philadelphia, Nov. 15.—George R. Earle, Jr., one of the most prominent financiers in Philadelphia, today resigned as a director of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company, which controls the street railways of the city, and rumor has it that he intends to stand as a candidate for mayor at the election in February. The reform element, through the city party, has announced that it intends to make a supreme effort to wrest control of municipal affairs from the Republican organiza-

tion. Mr. Earle has always been looked upon as a Democrat.

ADMITS SHORTAGE OF \$70,000.

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 15.—J. E. Hutchinson, second vice president of the Delta Cotton company, has admitted to the members of the firm and the police that he is short in his accounts approximately \$70,000. The shortage is said to cover a period of 10 years. On Nov. 2 Mr. Hutchinson attempted to commit suicide.

KILLED BY BOILER EXPLOSION.

Fort Smith, Ark., Nov. 15.—Four men were killed and a score injured, several fatally, by the explosion of a boiler of a cotton gin at Caulfield, Ark., upon the Arkansas Central railroad. Dead—John Gilbert, owner of the gin; Lewis Marshall, Charles White, W. B. Bell.

PLOT BY PRISONERS

Was to Blow up Guards' Quarters in Washington State Prison.

Walla Walla, Nov. 15.—According to members of the special prison commission officials of the state penitentiary have unearthed a plot to blow up the guard quarters with nitroglycerine stolen from the jail mill, and effect the release of nearly 200 convicts, as they were being marched from the prison to the mill. Three convicts are said to have been implicated. It is claimed the can of explosives and pieces of iron bar to be used as weapons were found in the cells.

HOSPITAL FOR MANILA.

St. Paul, Nov. 15.—The Women's Missionary society of the Methodist church announces that Dr. S. B. Johnson of this city has contributed \$2,000 for the building of a medical training school and hospital at Manila.

TO CONFER WITH UTE.

Omaha, Nov. 15.—Maj.-Gen. A. W. Greeley left over the Northwestern railroad this afternoon for Fort Meade to confer with the Ute Indians, who are expected there tomorrow, regarding their grievances and the means of quelling them.

HIGH PRICE OF MEAT.

Causes Disorders in Warsaw and Cavalry Patrol Streets.

Warsaw, Nov. 15.—The streets of Warsaw are again in control of the cavalry in consequence of threatened disorders because of the high price of meat. The butchers have been on strike for nearly a week and the price of meat is so high that the poor are unable to purchase even the smallest quantities.

ROOSEVELT'S LETTERS.

Two Sold at Public Auction for \$3.25 and \$1.40 Respectively.

New York, Nov. 15.—Two letters of President Roosevelt were among the interesting autographs at the sale yesterday of the collection of the late George M. Elwood of Rochester, N. Y. One of President Roosevelt's letters refers to his book, "The Winning of the West," as it was written on June 15, 1891, when Mr. Roosevelt was a civil service commissioner to Benjamin W. Austin, secretary of the Trinity Historical society, Dallas, Tex. Among other things he wrote: "You may possibly have seen a book of mine called 'The Winning of the West.' As soon as I can get out of my present position, I intend to continue that work, and to take it on through the period of the struggle for Texan independence. I am very anxious to get at any diaries or other manuscript material of the early settlers in Texas."

Mr. Roosevelt's public work has never given him time to carry out this expressed purpose. The letter which was typewritten was sold for
