FIRST ATTEMPT TO EXCLUDE CHINESE FROM ENGLAND.

London, Nov. 22.—The first attempt to exclude Chinese from landing in Great Britain is now occupying the at-tention of the immigration board. Thirty-two Chinamen from Hongkong, who arrived at Gravesend, made their who arrived at Gravesend, made their way to Liverpool, where they had been engaged to work in laundries, were re-fused permission to land, the immigra-tion officers basing their refusal on the Chinamen lacking means to support themselves. The case was appealed to the immigration board and after con-sideration decision was nontroned, the sideration, decision was postponed, the chairman of the board pointing out that this was the first case under the law and one of great importance.
