illis Excuse Was Mitchell Had Given Him His Start in Law Business.

Portland, Or., July 5 .- Judge A. H. Tanner, who committed perjury in orfer to shield his law partner, the late United States Senator John H. Mitchell, was pardoned by the president June 26. The announcement was made by Asst. Atty. Gen. Francis J. Heney today.

Judge Tanner was convicted on his awn confession that he had perjured almself before the federal grand jury in testifying that the partnership agreement of the firm of Mitchell & Tanner had been in existence several rears, whereas it was less than three ponths old. This agreement affected the division of attorneys' tees received for practice before any of the departments of the federal government should oclong exclusively to Tanuer.

It was upon this agreement that Sea-ter Mitchell intended to base his de-torget that he had received no money for practise before the departments, as ver charged in the indictment. Judge Tanner's confession was by far

the most sensational feature of the land fraud trials in this state, not even excepting Mitchell's indictment. Judge Fanner had been considered a man of intarrished reputation and his confes-tion are been as the of thunder from don came as a clap of thunder from a dear sky.

In an interview given to the Asso-tiated Press at the time, he said that re had confessed in order to save his son, who was a clerk in the law office of Miltchell & Tanner, and who had frawn up the contract, from going to prison. He excused his conduct in perjuring himself by saying that he had been on intimate terms with Mr. Mitchell since boyhood, and that it had been Mitchell who first gave him his start in the law business, not to men-tion his having been Mitchell's partner

or more than a decade. Judge Tanner was sympathized with by people here generally, where Sen-ator Mitchell's wonderful hold on his friends was best known. Judge Tan-ner was never sentenced, as it was scherally understood that the government would allow him immunity in consideration of the service he repfered it, when he later went on the witness stand during Mitchell's trial in the government's behalf.

Devices for Letting Pure Atmosphere

The nature study lesson at the university yesterday consisted of a demonstration of the necessity for proper ventilation, for deep breathing, and for open-air exercise for growing children

EXPERIMENTS IN BREATHING.

Some of the evils of impure air are that it makes the children drowsy, gives them a headache, and adversely affects their general vitality. The general subject of ventilation was introduced by means of two simple experiments: the class timed themselves in breathing for one minute, and it was shown that the average number of respirations per minute was 18; and by means breathing through a tube into a three-quart bottle filled with water and the quart bottle filled with water and the mouth inverted in a vessel of water, that an ordinary breath expels one quart of water. It follows that a per-son breathes 18 quarts, or about 1.039 cubic inches of air per minute. Other experiments showed that air once breathed will put out a lighted candle; and since life is a process of combus-tion, air that has been breathed may certionich the laws of life. extinguish the lamp of life.

RULES FOR BREATHING.

From these experiments the laws of breathing were easily deducible: 1. Breathe through the nostrils. Habitual mouth breathing shrinks the gums, causes the teeth to protrude, draws lines in the face, subjects the system to disease and is a serious menace to health. 2. Breathe deeply. The lower and broader parts of the lungs should be brought into play in the work of respiration. Breathing should not be confined to the chest but the abdommal muscles should participate in aiding the habit of receiving deep and full drafts of fresh air into the lungs. 3. Take very deep breaths in the open air several times daily. 4. Provide means for ventilating all rooms, particularly sleeping rooms and school rooms. There should be an ent-rance for the fresh air preferably under the stove or heater, from the out-side, and an open ventilating flue, or an open grate or open stove, in every

school room or meeting room. The lesson closed by the class mak-ing an inspection, under the profes-sor's direction, of the university heating plant, including the devices for securing good ventilation in the classrooms and laboratoires.
