east by Catherine creek, and west by

Reynolds' creek.

All free born white citizens only shall be entitled to hold or work mining claims in this district. Each person shall be entitled to hold one min-ing claim of each kind, by location. All discoverers shall be entitled to one additional claim by discovery. Creek claims shall be 300 feet in

length, and extend from the base line of one hill to the base of the hill opposite. Hill claims shall be 300 feet front, extending back 600 feet. Gulch claims shall be 300 feet square—the center of the gulch to be the center of the claim.

All claims shall be recorded within five days after location or they will be

considered forfeited.

No person shall locate a claim for another person, unless he is a resident of this country, and if not a resident, he must have a power of attorney to do so.

All claims properly loc ted and re-corded shall be laid over until the first of May, 1866, all claims or set of claims shall be worked four days each month; if not, they shall be considered for-

Charles Hilton was elected recorder of the district. He was to receive a fee of \$5 for each claim recorded and \$2.50 for each additional claim. In 1865 there were 337 claims located.

Governor Caleb Lyon was given four claims, which were selected by a committee composed of D. H. Fogus, J. McCourt and Wm. Musgrave. It is three of these claims that Messrs. Stearns, Givens and Gilmore have located.

Among those who attended the meeting at Anderson's ranch who are now living, were Mat Joyce, of Bruneau; Con Shea, of Silver City; J. W. Glimore, of Sinker creek and D. H. Fogus, of San Francisco.

# THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The board of education held a regular meeting last night, Vice President Nelson in the chair. The members present were Duke, Dooly, Young, Pratt, Baldwin and Newman.

# APPLICATIONS FOR EMPLOYMENT.

The applications of Thomas Jones, Jacob Chatterton, W. W. Bear, T. Ayland, E. McPherson and William Ed. munds, to be appointed janitors, were referred to the committee on furniture and supplies.

# JOHNSTONE'S U. S. HISTORY.

The committee on school work recommended the adoption of Johnstone's United States History for use in the high school and that ten copies be ordered. Adopted.

## APPROPRIATIONS RECOMMENDED.

The committee on sites and buildings recommended that an appropriation of \$128.80 be made to Heesh, Davis & Company for laying pipe at the Bryant school; \$51.80 for piacing sewer pipe at the Lincoln school, and \$112.70 for laying water service pipe with curb cock and street washers in connection with water mains at the Bryant echool. Adopted.

## SALE ORDERED.

The report of the committee on sites

and buildings recommending the sale of the Seventeenth school site to the Seventeenth Ward Ecclesiastical association for the sum of \$5500, the board to retain the use of the lower rooms for school purposes until a building is erected in that vicinity, was adopted and the sale ordered made.

### RESOLUTIONS BY YOUNG.

Trustee Young introduced a resolution that the superintendent of buildings be authorized to arrange with the contractors of the Lowell school for platforms for teachers' desks and incur the expense incidental thereto. Adopted.

The same gentleman offered a resolution that the committee on sites and buildings be directed to contract for the laying of a proper soil pipe for carrying away the water from the roof of the Lowell school building, Adopt-

#### WORK STOPPED.

Pratt moved that the superintendent of buildings be directed to suspend work on the heating and ventilating of Jackson and Hamilton schools un til the success of the system be demonstrated in the Lincoln and Bryant schools. Carried.

#### SEVENTEENTH WARD SITE SALE.

The following motion by Raybould prevailed:

That on payment of \$2750 cash on account of the purchase of the Seventeenth ward site by the Ecclesiastical Association of the Seventeeuth ward, a quit olaim deed be executed by this board and a note for \$2750 be executed in favor of this board without interest, secured by mortgage on the property conveyed. Or it pre-ferred by said association that a quit claim deed be executed by this board and placed in escrow until the whole sum of \$5500 be paid.

## BEWER CUNNECTION.

Raybould moved that the sum of \$375 be appropriated to pay for the sewer connection with the Lincoln school building when the voucher now in the hands of the Clerk be sworn to by the Superintendent of Sewers of the city. Carried.

# WEATHER BUREAU REPORT.

The following review of the Utab weather service, for the month of November has just been received:

Atmospheric pressure.—I'he monthly mean pressure was slightly above the average, being, at the Salt Lake station, 25.70 inches actual pressure, or 30.18 inches reduced to sea-level.

There was but one decided lowpressure area, which oc urred on the 24th; the month was therefore pleasant except on that date, when the pressure fell to 29.38 (sea-level), and a heavy snow-storm was general over the greater part of Utah. The storm was attenued by high winds, and followed by a severe cold wave, during which the lowest temperature of the month occurred at nearly all stations. The highest pressure, (30.54 sea-level) occurred on the 13th. The motibity The mouthly range of pressure, 1.15 in., is the greatest on record for any November except that of 1886.

Temperature-The monthly mean, deduced from 20 stations, was 36.7 degrees. It was probably about the normal for the Territory, being above the normal in the northern part, and below in the southern. Until the 18th the temperature remained close to the normal; then for six days a warm spelf lasted; then a cold spell occurred last. inguntil the 27th.

The warmest spell occurred on different dates in different localities; the coldest spell was unitorm, occurring from the 24th to 27th, at nearly all stations. 43.5 was the highest mean temperature reported, occurring at Fillmore, Millard county; 28.7 was the lowest reported, occurring at Grouse Creek, Box Elder county. Reports from St. George and Scoports from St. George and Sco-field, which usually give the ex-tremes for each month, have not been received. Fillmore reported the maximum, 76 ou the 12th; the minimum occurred at Loa, Wayne Co., being 6 50.00 degrees below zero on the 24th. Loa is situated in a high plateau region, which accounts in a measure for its 300 00 extreme low temperature.
