

A LUNATIC'S PRANKS.

Some time ago Pinder leased the lower rooms of his house to an Irish widow and her son, and he and his wife moved to upper rooms. That part of the upper floor over the dining room below was made of green poplar boards loosely laid. These have shrunk, leaving numerous and wide-vaping cracks. One day last week Pinder's tenants had company for dinner in the morning of the same day, Pinder procured two coal-oil barrels and put them in the room over the dining-room. Then he carried water up stairs by the bucketful until both barrels were filled. The barrels being in position to suit his designs, he took a stand and waited for the auspicious moment of action. Things below progressed serenely. The hostess and guests felt happy and secure, without a single suspicion of the storm that was about to burst upon them. The dinner, a substantial feast, came on smoking hot, and the party gathered around the table to do justice to the occasion. Then there came a maniacal yell from above, and a flood of water that drenched them to their skins, and literally washed the dinner from the table. Pinder ran out and danced for joy, and shouted at the top of his voice that he was having lots of fun. Just then he caught sight of Marshal Oden, who was approaching the scene of the deluge, and he ran back up the stairs. Oden followed, and was met at the head of the stairs by Pinder with an ax. Oden then went away, but soon returned with his deputy. Pinder was still at bay, and hacked about him furiously with the ax when any attempt was made to arrest him. Finally, at the risk of losing their lives, the marshal and deputy made a grand rush at Pinder, and were fortunate in securing him without the loss of blood. SUNLIP ROOMS.

No article of furniture should be put in a room that will not stand sunlight for every room in a dwelling should have the windows so arranged that some time during the day a flood of sunlight will force itself into the apartment. The importance of admitting the light of the sun freely to all parts of our dwellings cannot be too highly estimated. Indeed, perfect health is nearly as much dependent on pure sunlight as it is on pure air. Sunlight should never be excluded except when so bright as to be uncomfortable to the eyes. A daily walk should be taken in bright sunshine. A sun-bath is of more importance in preserving a healthy condition of the body than is generally understood. A sun-bath costs nothing, and that is a misfortune, for people are deluded with the idea that those things only can be good or useful which cost money. But remember that pure water, fresh air, and sunlight homes kept free from dampness, will secure you from many heavy bills of doctors, and give you health and vigor which no money can procure. It is a well-established fact that the people who live much in the sun are usually stronger and more healthy than those whose occupations deprive them of sunlight. And certainly there is nothing strange in the result, since the same law applies with equal force to nearly every animate being in nature. It is quite easy to arrange an isolated dwelling so that every room may be filled with sunlight some time in the day, and it is possible that many town houses could be made as comfortable more light than they now receive.—The Californian.
