He was pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian church in this city, prior to accepting the college presidency, removing to the national capital after being chosen chairman of the greens committee, and Miss Kate Williams chairman of the tennis section. Miss Williams was also appointed delegate to the International Tennis association meeting, to be held next August in this city. A resolution was adopted providing for a return to the original membership fee of \$25 for men and \$10 for women. As there is no vice president, the directors or trustees will direct the affairs of the institution. While the new chapel of Westminster is completed, no further buildings will be indulged in for some time. The chapel will be occupied next month by the Third Presbyterian church.

LIGHT PETITION BEFORE COUNCIL.

Martin Tried to Have it Laid on Table But Was Ruled Out of Order.

WHOLE MATTER IS REFERRED.

Communication From the Mayor Relative to His Position in the Premises.

After quite a little skirmish, the city council last night referred the petition of the Utah Light & Power company for an extension of its franchise to an additional 50 years, to the municipal laws and special water committees.

The communication from Mayor Morris denying certain statements in the company's petition was also read and referred to the same committees. When the petition was read, Fernstrom moved that it and the franchise accompanying be referred to the committees named above.

Black was perfectly willing that the petition should be referred, but he objected to the ordinance going to the council, as he had several attempts to have the ordinance read and voted on, but was unsuccessful. Fernstrom contended that it was always the custom to refer such matters to the committees, and not to vote on them when first presented. Black insisted that the ordinance should go over and be read under that order of business.

Martin tried to have the ordinance read and voted on, but he was ruled out of order. The ordinance was not properly before the council, as it did not bear the signature of a member of the council. President Hewitt sustained the point and announced that all the bills pertaining to the petition were referred to the committees.

THE MAYOR'S LETTER. The following communication from the mayor was then read: "Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 7, 1904.

"To the President and Board of Directors, Utah Light and Power Company, City of Salt Lake, Utah: I am endeavoring to secure an adequate water supply principally from Big Cottonwood canyon and to bring the said water into the city at a sufficient height to connect with the main system. It will be necessary for the city to secure the old paper mill water rights now owned and controlled by your company.

"I would respectfully request that you advise me at your earliest opportunity the price of this water right, bearing in mind, of course, that this is a very large sum of money. It is the policy of the city and as the franchise of the city is in a strained condition it is possibly unnecessary for me to suggest that a very reasonable price be paid for the same. "Awaiting your early reply, I am, very respectfully, (Signed), "RICHARD P. MORRIS, Mayor."

The following reply was duly received: "Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 8, 1904. "Hon. R. P. Morris, Mayor, Salt Lake City, Utah: I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of September 7. This to advise you that the subject matter presented by you for our consideration, namely the purchase by the city of the old paper mill water rights near the mouth of Cottonwood canyon will be presented to the executive for action on Wednesday next, the 14th instant. As the matter is of much importance, I cannot assure you of very hasty action in the premises, but due consideration of the interests of the city and of the franchise of the city are conditions that can be consistently made by our company in favor of the corporation will be given, having in view, however, naturally, the preservation of our own rights and interests. "Respectfully yours, (Signed), "UTAH LIGHT AND POWER CO., "R. S. Campbell, General Manager."

Several weeks ago the manager of this letter had a conversation with Mr. R. S. Campbell, the manager of the company, who stated that the rights which the city desired to acquire were very valuable and could be sold for a large amount, but that the company did not wish to part with them, unless they were required by the city. I told him that, while the city desired to acquire the water rights, it was not then in a position to pay out any large sum of money for them. He replied that the company owned several franchises, some of which had been acquired from other parties, that they expired at different times, and that it would be a great advantage to the company to have them consolidated. He stated that the company desired to issue more bonds, and if it had one franchise covering all its rights it would be easier to raise the money on the new bonds than it would be on different franchises, whose terms were not uniform and which expired at different times. Later he told me that if such a franchise could be obtained from the city, the company would be willing to convey the desired rights in exchange therefor. I told him that if the company would prepare such a franchise as it desired, I would submit it to the city council for consideration. Very respectfully, (Signed), RICHARD P. MORRIS, Mayor.

MARTIN'S RASH MOTION. Martin then secured the floor and moved that the petition be laid on the table. He was ruled out of order.

NEWHOUSE PROPOSITION. The communication from Samuel Newhouse, in regard to his proposition relative to installing an electric light plant in this city and furnishing light at not to exceed 10 cents per kilowatt hour, and with a minimum charge of 75 cents per month, was read and referred to the committee of the whole.

GROGERS' GRIEVANCE. The Retail Butchers and Grocers' association petitioned the council to amend the license ordinance so that grocers carrying fresh meats will not have to pay a double license. The petition states that such a plan of license discriminates against a class of merchants that can least afford it.

Under the present system a meat dealer who desires to carry groceries or a grocer who desires to carry meats is compelled to pay a retail butchers' license and also a grocers' license. This, the petition states, is a hardship and the association asks relief. The petition was referred to the committees on municipal laws and license.
