Drowned in Bear River.—A man named Daniel A. Manull is reported to have been drowned in Bear River, at Cottonwood Ford, on Monday morning last. The *Enterprise* states, on the authority of a gentleman from Gentile Valley the day after the reported fatality, that the unfortunate young man was crossing the river on horseback in company with a friend who was also on a horse. The latter taking the lead, upon reaching the opposite shore, heed a call for assistance, and upon looking around saw that the horse, which Mr. Manull was riding had become unmanageable, and was making back for the shore from whence it started. He immediately turned his horse and crossed the river, but before he could render any assistance the young man was taken down by the swift current of the river, and was not seen again. A number of men were informed of the sad occurrence, who immediately began to drag the river in search of the body, but up to last accounts it had not been found.

Deceased was 21 years of age, born and raised at Payson, Utah, and was a steady young man, and highly respected by his many friends.
