## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Three Per Cent**—The State bank paid a quarterly dividend of 3 per cent yesterday.

**Level of Lake**—The level of the great lake has fallen only 2-10 of an inch in the last two weeks, which is considered slight for this time of year.

**Record Wheat Crop**—According to reports from growers about the harvest the heaviest wheat crop in years will be harvested in this section this season.

**Stork Brought a Boy**—At 12:45 a. m. yesterday a stork brought a boy to Mrs. William H. Hartman of this city, at the family residence, 11 Wellington court.

**A. H. Manning**, lieutenant-sergeant of the 25th Infantry, has been promoted to sergeant. The corps will signal next Sunday, between Lagoon and Saltair.

**New Packing Plant**—The roof of the new packing plant at Bountiful is being put on and if the machinery reaches this city on time, the plant will be in working order by Sept. 1.

**Hawaiian Convalescent**—John Puna, a member of the Hawaiian band, has been ill with pneumonia at the L. D. S. hospital, but will be able to leave for Denver later in the week to rejoin his command.

**Dr. Thome Chosen**—Dr. W. M. Thome has been chosen by the executive board of the Utah State Christian Endeavor, as a member of the board to take the place of Charles A. Broadus resigned.

**Hint to Merchants**—Manager Campbell has notified local merchants that if they will work up a systematic demand for the carriage, the company will respond by establishing such a service.

**Quick Mail Service**—The through mail service between this city and the east ought to be speedy enough to suit. A letter mailed from Salt Lake to New Haven, Conn., on the 10th inst., brought a reply this morning.

**Assigned to Twenty-ninth Infantry**—These cadets who graduated from the military academy last June have been assigned to the Twenty-ninth Infantry, Lieut. Donald A. Robinson, Horace F. Spurpin and Robert N. Campbell.

**Owl Cars Laid Out**—There was a storm last midnight, that affected the telephone, and power companies, and lights in the city went out several times. The "Owl" cars on the street railway were delayed for a long time.

**Three Counties to Hear From**—The officials of Salt Lake and Weber counties have sent in their lists of assessable property to the state board of equalization, which leaves three counties yet to hear from, Garfield, Kane and Carbon.

**Vacation Trip**—Will Matt, Farrell Gallacher, Albert Pritchard, Abner Chase, David Hill and Edward Hill have gone to the Uintah mountains and the Strawberry country for an outing. They have two wagons and a complete camping outfit.

**Jed Grant Released**—Judge Whitaker has released Jed Grant upon his own recognizance. Grant was arrested for forgery committed on July 4 and since his arrest he has been adjudged an incompetent and his father has been appointed as his guardian.

**Dividend Declared**—The Salt Lake Security & Trust company has declared its regular semi-annual dividend of 8 1/2 per cent, and added \$5,000 to the surplus. This makes a total of 14 per cent dividend on the stock since the company was incorporated two years ago, and a surplus earning of \$20,000.

**School Furniture**—There will be a meeting of the committee on buildings and grounds of the board of education this afternoon at 3 o'clock in Clerk Judd's office. An adjourned meeting of the board will be held tomorrow night. The matter to be considered at both meetings is the purchase of school furniture for the new school buildings.

**Major Angus Promoted**—Army Orders announce that Maj. A. A. Angus of the Twenty-ninth Infantry, in command of the First Battalion at Fort Logan, has been promoted to lieutenant colonel, and has been assigned to staff duty at Washington. Col. Angus graduated from West Point in 1877, and was made a major in 1901. He is a native of Michigan.

**Taken to Reform School**—Sheriff Thomas Haycock of Garfield county was in the city last night en route to Ogden to take two boys who were committed to the Industrial school from that county. Hyrum McNeely and William Baker are the boys. They burglarized a store in Garfield county and when arrested pleaded guilty and were sent to the reform school.

**Van Dam Chosen**—The directors of the Utah Credit Men's association met last night, and chose Herbert Van Dam Jr., as manager to succeed John Q. Critchlow resigned. There were 16 candidates for the position. Van Dam has been assistant manager for some time, and the directors have every confidence in him.

**Fell Off Load of Hay**—While coming up State street with a load of hay, Samuel Williams, a man 79 years of age, was precipitated to the ground by the overturning of the load. He was seriously injured, and owing to his advanced age much apprehension is felt by his friends as to the outcome. Mr. Williams was taken to his home on Quince street, and Dr. E. W. Whitney was called to attend him.

**Live Stock Insurance Co.**—The Indiana & Ohio Live Stock Insurance company of Crawfordsville, Ind., has filed a copy of its articles of incorporation with the secretary of state's office. Its capital stock is \$100,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. A. F. Ramsey is president, D. W. Rountree, treasurer, Zack Mahoney, secretary. E. H. Pierce of this city, agent for Utah.

Not a Salt Lake Girl—When word reached Salt Lake from Portland, Ore., that a Miss Anna Hartman had been drowned in the Willamette river, many people supposed that the victim was the daughter of Mrs. Anna Hartman, who formerly conducted a manufactory in this city, and much anxiety was felt by the young lady's numerous friends here. It has been learned definitely, however, that the former Salt Lake girl was not the person drowned in Oregon, but is a resident of Clifton, Alaska.

**Will Appoint Delegates**—A communication has been received by Gov. Cutler from Dr. M. M. Smith, president of the American congress, urging attention to the next meeting of the congress to be held in New York on Nov. 14, 15 and 16 and asking that Utah send delegates. The letter also stated that Gov. Cutler has been appointed as one of the honorary vice presidents of the congress. Gov. Cutler has accepted the honor and has requested the state board of health to recommend delegates for appointment.

**Gov. Kibbey's Proclamation**—Gov. Cutler today received a copy of the proclamation of Gov. J. H. Kibbey of Arizona, apportioning delegates among the various counties of that territory to the convention which will form a constitution for the new state of Arizona which will be composed of the present territories of Arizona and New Mexico. The act of Congress admitting the state was approved on June 16, 1906. The proclamation of the governor also provides for the approval of the act of Congress by the voters at the regular election on Nov. 6 and also for the election of state officials. Arizona will have 44 delegates to the constitutional convention and New Mexico will have 66.

**Bust of Cecilia Sharp**—Prof. M. H. Young, the artist, is completing a bust of Cecilia Sharp, wife of Miss Alice, a superb head and bust of Cecilia Sharp. It is life size, with the eyes looking down, with a quiet and contemplative expression. The work is considered the finest of the kind ever done in this city, and the head and bust produced in bronze or marble would be considered worth \$1,000. Prof. Young is now engaged on the completion of a child, which evidences the efforts of a master hand.

**MONTANA PROSPERING.**  
Geo. Y. Wallace Tells of Conditions Encountered During Recent Trip.

George Y. Wallace has returned from Montana. He says that Montana is enjoying the greatest season of prosperity in its history, with crops heavy and a steady stream of immigrants pouring into the state. The dry hench farmers are particularly in high feather because of the extent of their grain harvest. Mr. Wallace says the state is growing so that the Bell Telephone company is doubling up its Butte plant and increasing the size of the switchboards at all central stations. The extension of the main line east from Billings is a question of getting copper, as the market is bare and there is none to spare at the eastern houses. In fact the demand is so far in excess of the supply that none can be had before October. The Bell company has been very fortunate in placing its cable orders, so that the eastern factories will begin this month filling the Utah order for \$100,000 worth of cable, and this order is only 1 per cent of the firm's total business. The firm has added \$15,000,000 worth of improvement to its already extensive plant, thus showing the tremendous demand for copper goods.

## WILLE SMITH KILLED BY BOLT

Fifteen-Year-Old Boy Struck Down by Lightning Last Evening During Storm.

WAS FOUND BY THE ROADSIDE

Had Been Out Hunting for Frogs and Was on His Way Home When Death Occurred.

A boy named Willie Smith was struck dead by lightning at a late hour yesterday afternoon. He was on his way home from the Jordan river, whither he had gone in quest of frogs, when without warning he was struck down and the body remained undiscovered for several hours.

Just as it was getting dark, William Bouck, while passing the spot where young Smith fell, found the remains stiff and cold by the roadside. Bouck hailed D. E. Evans, of the Internal Revenue office, who happened to be driving past, and by them the body of the dead boy was taken home. Dr. William F. Beer was summoned, but he pronounced the boy as having been long since dead.

The parents of the boy are Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Smith, who reside at 535 Marion avenue. They are grief-stricken over the tragic and untimely death of their son. He was 15 years old, and a wrapper at Keith-O'Brien's, and had a large circle of friends. He had asked for and received a half-holiday yesterday. His fall was partly filled with frogs, the object of his search among the sloughs, when he was found.
