

ute book some valuable laws. I refer particularly to the long contested question relating to the subject of burials, to the education act and the act for better determining the liability of employees, and to these I would add the act relating to ground game, the repeal of the malt duty, the savings bank act and the post-office money orders act, and measures for bettering the condition of merchant seamen and providing for safer carriage of grain cargoes; and I trust that these measures may, under Divine Providence, contribute to the welfare and prosperity of my people.

During the ceremony of the prorogation of the members of the House of Commons, about 60 were present, including Premier Gladstone, of the members of the House of Lords. Besides five royal commissioners, only one Liberal and two Conservative peers were present, together with 35 ladies, none of whom were peeresses. The north gallery of the House of Lords was filled with spectators. The ceremony of prorogation lasted 17 minutes. Parliament was prorogued until the 24th of November.

PARIS, 7.—Details received of the accident at Roscoff coast, Finesterre, by which Mrs. Hennessy, an American lady, Viscount Fleury and two natives of England, were drowned from a boat belonging to the Russian *Gabitzin*. It appears that the boat was old and unseaworthy, and one of two sailors miscalculated the height of the tide. The boat consequently beat on the rocks and was capsized. A young Russian with a party made great efforts to save his companions. Mrs. Hennessy clung to a portion of the boat for some time, but ultimately released her hold and was drowned.

The Powers have informed the Porte that its last offer relative to the Montenegrin frontier is unsatisfactory, and that the naval demonstration will take place. The situation is regarded as full of danger.

The Powers have invited the Porte to order Risa Pasha, with his troops, to co-operate with the allied squadron in Turkish waters. The Turkish newspapers have been authorized to contradict the statement that Risa Pasha has broken off negotiations with the Albanian League, and is about to use force.

The arrival at Reval of two American vessels laden with grain, has opened the eyes of the Russians to the deficiencies of their system of agriculture.

Seventy-two houses in the village of Pestnick, Pomerania, have been destroyed by fire.

A new issue of the *Nihilist Will of the People*, has been put into circulation at St. Petersburg. It bears the date of September 3d.

The difficulties between Russia and China have been finally arranged and the new treaty will be signed at Peking.

Gen. Skobelloff has been summoned by the Czar to Livadia to participate in the council of war in regard to the further prosecution of the Tekke expedition. It is understood Gen. Skobelloff insists upon the necessity of punishing the Turcomans of Mero.

Cavalry patrols report villages full of the enemy's dead and wounded. The Cabul regiments have dispersed. The Kozibbas cavalry are seeking to come to terms. Gen. Phayes is within two stages of Candahar and will halt for the present.

A steamer from Loanda to Lisbon brings the following news: The Portuguese steamer belonging to the recently established Coanza Company had steamed up the Congo to Noki, two hours' sail from Bibs, headquarters of Henry M. Stanley's expedition. Stanley told the captain of the steamer that his object was not commerce, but to open a path for future trades.

The Albanians have twice attempted to fire Duleigno.

Risa Pasha has formally notified the local authorities that the town will be ceded on the 12th inst.
