AN ATROCIOUS DEED.

Our dispatches to-day contain Intelligence that will send a thrill of horror throughout the community of Latter-day Saints. If the statement to which we allude be true, a bloody massacre of noble and innocent men has occurred in Tennessee. The report has too much the appearance of truth to be wholly inaccurate, yet ft would be unwise to receive it as correct in entirety peading the reception of further details and particulars.

Taking the story as true in the main the savage deed is one of the most cold-blooded, cruel and cowardly on record. With masked faces, or the Sabbath day, a mob of armed and bloodthirsty miscreants murdered a number of unoffending men and wounded an innocent woman, not because their victims were charged with say illegal or criminal act, but for the sole reason that they differed in religious views from the relentless and red-handed mobocrats.

This terrible deed follows close upon the murder of Elder Joseph Standing (in the State of Georgia) whose assassing were allowed to go unwhipped of justice. Closer still is its occurrence to the attempted murdep of Elder Alexander in the same State. Sir:-I have the honor to ackowledge the receipt of your communication of Aug. 4th, 1884, addressed to the Utah Commission, and to say that the same will receive due consideration by the Commission at the proper time. We do not see how, or on what pretext, the Commission can claim that the votes for these territorial officers, elected under the provisions of the Act of Congress of Feb. 21, 1856, and of the Utah Legislature of January 21, 1857, should not be counted. The whole matter of the selection and dis-position of the lands in question was placed by Congress under the direction of the Legislature. The offices created by the Assembly for the purpose of locating the lands are to be filled by the voters of the whole Territory, so in one sense they are territorial officers. But they form no part of the Territorial Government and are simply a Board chosen for a special purpose to transact business, the whole of which is placed by Congress under the direction of the Legislature.

Oun readers are aware that the Utah Commissioners have ruled that territo-rial officers are not to be elected by the people but appointed by the Governor and LegislativeCouncil of the Territory. That they have no authority to pass upon this question and that it belongs solely to the Courts, is as certain as anything can be that is in dispute. But as the election returns are practically, though not legally, under their control,
