Washington, April 9 .- At the present time there are 115 vacancies in the grade of second lieutenant in the army, of these 6s are in the infantry arm, 14 in the artillery and 27 in the cavalry. There will probably be a few more places in each, depending upon the result of pending examinations for promotion
