Robberies in Texas-Nominated

-The Case of Fitz John Porter.

WASHINGTON, 27.-Postmaster

General Jewett has received tele-

gram from Corpus Christi, Texas,

stating that the post office at Nueces

was robbed and burned yesterday;

that the San Antonio mail train

was robbed and taken prisoner, that

the mail, however, was saved; and

that no mail will be sent out to-

day. It is supposed the State de-

partment has been notified of these

outrages by the band of armed

Mexicans reported near Corpus

Christi. A copy of the dispatch

will be turned by the State de-

partment for a suitable investigation.

New Orleans, 27.-The Galveston

News special from Corpus

Christi, Texas, dated today, says:-

"The band of Mexicans came

within several miles of the city, and

robbed several stores and houses,

and took a large number of Ameri-

cans prisoner, among them Judge

Gilpin, formerly mayor of the city,

and two women. They compelled

the captives to walk in front of

them, and then mounted on horse-

back, and hurried to the postoffice

at Nueces, and robbed and

took prisoner all the men, women

and children in the place. A fight

was reported near Ban-

quette, in which one Mexican and

two Americans were killed. All

except the women, escaped and

nothing has been heard of them.

Business is mostly suspended and

the citizens are under arms.

Information has been received

from Los Alamos, New Mexico,

that throughout the entire region

between here and the Rio Grande

lawless bands of Mexicans are

continually raiding, robbing and

murdering, and driving stock across

the river into Mexico.

WESTERN.

China and Japan.

SAN FRANCISCO, 23.-The S. S.

Vasco da Gama arrived from Hong

Kong Feb. 27, Shanghai, Feb. 28.

Many dead bodies of Chinese

have been taken from the wreck

of the Pacific mail steamship Ya-

pan, all of which were kept under

water by the money fastened about

them. The report of the Chinese

commissioners to Cuba, to exam-

vised to the Cuban authorities. Work

on the Huabao telegraph line con-

tinues suspended. There are con-

tinual rumors from Peking of

public disturbances, but there is

nothing authentic to show a

likelihood of interruption to the

press of the telegraph. The

risons, which separates him from his

parents and companions for ever.

Yokohama, March 6th.-The Mi-

ko visited the government navy

yard at Yokohama, March 5th, to

witness the launch of the new

first man-of-war constructed on

foreign principles; there was a gen-

eral gathering of the military.

and seventy-seven feet long, thirty

feet beam, with sixteen feet depth
