UTAH RATES REDUCED.

The Bar Iron Tariff Sustains a Big Cut—Passenger Rates also Lowered.

The Colorado-Utah Traffic association has issued amendment No. 25, effective Aug. 27, reducing the rate on bar iron or steel, straight or mixed, car loads, from Colorado emigrant points to Utah common points from 75¢ cents per 100 pounds to 50¢ per 100 pounds; also reducing the rate on empty oil and vinegar barrels returned from Utah emigrant points to Colorado common points from \$1.25 per 100 pounds to 62¢ cents per 100 pounds.

NEW RAILWAY ORGANIZATION

A Union of Employes to be Elected Here in the Star Future.

The American Railway Union is the title of a new organization that is being quietly formed here among the railroad men. The society is a secret one, and is designed to include in its membership all grades of employes, from the Chinese, Italian and section hand to the locomotive engineer. Its object is a paternal and protective one, and the movement is greatly favored by railroad employes here and is rapidly gaining strength.

A mass meeting of the railroaders has been arranged to be held in this city on September 6th at some hall not yet designated, to take the first step toward effecting the formation of a general railroad union throughout the country.

From various late movements on the part of the English Land Company, operating in lower California, and from information gained from London and Mexico, it is said to be apparent that operations will soon be undertaken to construct a transcontinental railway across the Isthmus of Panama, connecting the Pacific and Atlantic oceans. The concession to build the railway across the Isthmus of Panama has been granted to the English Land Company, and the work is to be completed within a specified time. It is now learned that the company through its agents at the City of Mexico has secured a charter whereby irrigation works will be accepted in lieu of the railroad, as more rapidly isolating emigration.
