Chicago, March 3.--Wheat was nervous at the opening with trade ex-tremely light. But the fact that the Liverpool market failed to be affected by yesterday's local decline and small northwestern receipts coupled with the good demand by commission houses soon induced a firmer tone. May opened ¼ at %c lower to ¼ at %c ligher at 97% at % and ad-vanced to 98%. Corn was firm at the opening des-pite lower cables and local receipts which were much heavier than antici-pated. May pork opened un-changed at 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>/<sub>2</sub> lower at 11.67<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> at 11.70, and sold up to 767<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>. Ribs were 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>/<sub>2</sub> lower at 650 and sold up to 655. The wheat market became very strong in the last hour, advancing from 2 to 3 eents above the low point. The corn market was affected by the late strength in wheat, piles gaining more than one cent over the low point.
