

Imperial Rescript Creating Com mission to Discuss Question Of Land Tenures.

IMPERIAL DOMAINS THREATENED

Some Danger That Shrewd Agitators May Use Document to Further Their Own Eads.

St. Petersburg, April 14 .- The imperial rescript addressed yesterday to the minister of the interior, M. Boullgan, creating a special commisison under his presidency to discuss the questions relating to peasant tenure of lands, is a direct recognition of the grave peril involved in the spreading peasant agitation which threatens not only the big estates but the imperial domains. The instructions in the rescript to work out a system clearly marking off peasant land from the land of other owners, "in order to inculcate in the people a perception of property ownership," amounts to an imperiat

in the people a perception of property ownership," amounts to an imperiat refutation of the stories gurrent amounts the peasants that the eniperor had de-creed a new division of the land. It is feared, however, it may have exactly the contrary effect to the one desired among the ignorant peasantry, and that shrewd agitators will be able to employ the rescript hearing upon the

desired among the ignorate peasands, and that shrew agitators will be able to employ the rescript bearing upon the general subject of the increase of peas-ant lands as being a confirmation in-stead of a deriki of the reports that the agitators had previously circulated about the emperor's intention to redis-tribute the land. Two methods of relief are proposed by the rescript—the purchase of addi-tional land by the aid of a peasant's bank and the colonization of Siberia. The creation of the new commission sounded the knell of the add Witte com-mission, which is simultaneously abol-ished. M. Witte's commission, which was of a much broader character, cov-ering all questions relating to peasant administration, created a tremendous stir two years ago, being the signal for motion and the method of the new auministration, created a tremendous stir two years ago, being the signal for much outspoken criticism of the pres-ent regime on the part of the zemstvos, notably that of Tver, which was "re-vised" out of existence by the late In-terior Minister von Plehve.

An immense amount of material was collected by the commission, but its work became so diffuse and it accom-plished so little in the way of tangible results, that its pasisng away has aroused no regret. But the supplanting of one commission by another serves to emphasize the criticism of the Liberals in regard to the futility of reformain regard to the futility of reforms conducted by bureaucratic commissions.

The government claims, however, that as the work of the new commission is being restricted solely to the question of being restricted solely to the question of devising ways for supplying the peas-ants with additional land it should speedily accomplish something. Never-theless, in quarters familiar with the situation among the peasants serious doubts are expressed as to whether the rescript will have an appreciable ef-fect in allaying the agrarian agitation. "Like all the acts of the autocracy it comes too late," said a prominent noble-man who has a large estate near Mog-bilaff and who considers it unsafe to

MOSCOW WORKMEN RECEIVED.

St. Petersburg, April 15, 1:15 a. m.-In receiving a delegation of workmen from Moscow yesterday Finance Minister Kokovsoff gave notice to the work-men of Russia that a government commission is now formulating legislation to remedy the greater part of their grievances, including state insurance against sickness, abolishing the prohi-bition of unions and criminal punish-ment for strikes, and for the establishment of an industrial court in which employers and employed shall be rep-

employers and employed shall be rep-resented. The minister pointed out to the dela-gation the impossibility of elaborating in a moment legislation of such weighty and far-reaching churacter. He da-chared that the energy with which the commission is working gave it the right to demand sufficient time for the prep-aration and consideration of the pro-posed laws and said that industrial dis-turbances such as have occurred ham-per instead of furthering the work. The interview with the minister of finance, lasting an hour and a half, is another indication of the general con-ciliatory spirit of the government. The evident desire to cure, wherever pos-sible, the maladies of the empire is manifested by the peasant commission, the Finnish and Polish concessions and the establishment of the Bouligan com-mission. The government throughout takes the stand that all these reforms are too great to be lightly or hastily handled, and that premature and ill-considered legislation would be worse than none at all. It appeals to the dis-satisfied to give their rulers a full and fair chance to accomplish the legisla-tion they demand. tion they demand.

RAILWAY MEN INCLUDED.

St. Petersburg, April 15, 5:15 a. m.→ Before leaving St. Petersburg for Si-beria to superintend the improvement of the Transsiberian railway and to Inaugurate a river transportation service in Siberia, Minister of Railways Hilsoft issued a circular to every employe announcing that he had ordered the speedy preparation of legislation cov-ering many points for the improvement of conditions of service and the rights of employes in accordance with a petition by workmen, as well as a disciplinary

He promised to consider an increase of wages in some cases and the aboli-tion of a large amount of correspon-dence and red tape in railway manage-ment, but he reminded the employes that many of their demands cover unsatisfactory conditions necessarily nected with the existing state of war.

Suit Against Laing Dismissed.

TRIUMPHANTLY

Ambassador Porter Succeeds in Finding the Body of John Paul Jones.

FOUND TO BE WELL PRESERVED.

Will be Brought to United States and Interred in National Cemetery At Arlington.

Paris, April 14 .- The remarkable earch which Ambassador Porter has conducted for the body of Paul Jones has been crowned with success by the discovery of the body and its identifiation today by the highest French medical experts as unquestionably that of the famous American admiral who

founded the American navy. Ambassador Porter cabled to Washngton tonight announcing the successful result of his long and difficult search. The body is in a good state of preservation, considering the interment took place over 100 years ago. The circumstances leading to the final discovery of the body are particdarly interesting. Gen. Porter has conducted the search for the last five years and when Congress recently took to action upon the president's recommendation for the expenses incldent o the search, the ambassador continied the extensive labors at his own expense.

A large force of workmen has been uguged night and day tunneling and ross-tuneling the old St. Louis cemetery. This constituted a huge operation, embracing nearly a block cov-ared with buildings and requiring a system of subternanean mining.

Hundreds of wooden caskets were found, but not until Wednesday were mearthed four leaden caskets which gave promise of containing the body e admiral. Three of them bore plates leisgnating the names of the deceased The fourth showed superior solidity α workmanship. No plate was found on this casket and it is supposed it was this clasket and it is supposed it was removed when another coffin was su-perimposed on it. The leaden coffin was opened in the presence of Gen. Porter, Col. Bailey Blanchard, second secretary of the American embassy, and Engineer Wels, who has been di-recting the excavation

served, owing to its being immersed in alcohol. It was wrapped in a sheet with a packing of straw and hay. Those present were immediately struck by the resemblance of the head to that n the medalions and bust of the ad-

After the most minute examination he following facts were fully substantiated: Length of body, five feet seven inches, the admiral's height; size and shape of the head agree with several peculiarities identical with the head of the admiral.

head of the admiral. Hair, dark brown, the same as the admiral's; in places slightly gray, in-dicating a person of his age, 45 years. The hair is long, reaching below the shoulders, and is combed back and gathered in a clasp at the back of the neck.

The face is clean shaven, all correponding exactly with the descriptions ortraits and busts of the admiral. portraits and busts of the admiral. The linen is in good condition. One article bears an initial either "J" or an Inverted "P." The bothy was care-fully packed. The limbs were wrapped in tin foll, presumably for sea trans-portation as indicated in a letter of the admiral's nearest friend and a pall bearer of his funeral. Col. Blackden, who said:

It will be placed in a handsome asket and deposited in the receiving ault of the American church on the venue de l'Alma until the ambassa-lor can learn the opinion of the govrnment concerning the most appropri-le means of transporting it to the United States and giving a fitting repulchre to the body of the Illusutri-us sailor whose place of burial had so ong remained a mystery.

BODY WILL BE BROUGHT TO AMERICA.

Washington, April 14 .- Ambassador Porter's dispatch announcing the find-ing of the body of John Paul Jones reached the state department today. It is probable that a recommenda-lon will be made to Congress at P next session looking to Ambassador Porter's reimbursement. The remains of John Paul Jones are to be brought here and interred in the National cemetery at Arlington, and it is like-ly that the transfer will be made the occasion of an interesting demonstra-tion.
