BOSTON, 5.—The whaling bark *Louise* was lost September 22d, in the Arctic Ocean, by striking ice. Six men perished. The Captain and Chief Officer arrived at San Francisco yesterday in the bark *Francis Palmer*.

NEW YORK, 5.—In the suit of Field vs. the Northern Pacific Railway, recently removed to the United States Court, Circuit Judge Wallace, Oct. 31st, ordered the restraining order and the order to show cause, made by the State Court, to be heard to-day. Saturday Field's counsel gave notice that plaintiff would not resist a motion to vacate the injunction and are hearing the case this morning. The injunction and order to show cause will be vacated and set aside.

BOSTON, 15.—O. F. Dorney alias Halpert, German fugitive, brought from San Francisco on the charge of defaulting Montreal firms and banks and Kidder, Peabody & Co., of this city, of a large amount, was held in \$50,000 bail.

ST. JOHN'S, 5.—At the south side of St. John's harbor, this morning, a coal shed fell, crushing several laborers. Two were taken out dead and four others seriously wounded. It is feared others are buried in the coal heap.

PATERSON, N.J., 4.—Wm. Swinburne, pioneer locomotive builder, is dead, aged 78.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., 5.—Members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union have decided to turn out to-morrow and work at the polls in favor of the prohibition ticket.

ST. LOUIS, 5.—Mary Churchill, in charge of her father, arrived this morning from Indianapolis. She still refuses to state why she ran away from home. This ends the Churchill sensation.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Upton, second comptroller of the currency, in his annual report suggests a statute of limitations on war claims. This, he thinks, would effectively prohibit any claim agent or attorney from presenting claims, as has heretofore been done without even an attempt to ascertain whether meritorious or not.

OTTAWA, 5.—Lord Landsdowne has received several letters threatening his life.

CHICAGO, 4.—The *Times'* Boston special says: The indications are that Robinson will be elected Governor of Massachusetts to-morrow by from 3000 to 20,000 majority, and that republicans will gain largely in every county, but Berkshire.

ST. LOUIS, 4.—Sullivan, pugilist, pitched for a picked nine on Sunday in the base ball game here. He attracted thousands to the field, but proved a wretched failure as a pitcher.

PRINCETON, W.V., 5.—Mrs. Ellen Lang, a widow, and L. S. Whittemore, father of the boy found in the river with his throat cut, have been arrested for murder. Detectives who took the case had their suspicions turned to Mrs. Long because of rumors that she once attempted to poison Whittemore's wife and failed. Searching her house, they found bloody clothes which she had been wearing up to the time of the murder and a butcher knife and two razors stained with blood. In a well on her premises was found a club with blood marks on it. The neighbors say that criminal intimacy existed between the widow and Whittemore and that it was known to his 11-year-old son, who was probably thus disposed of to stop the scandal. The boy had been missing 13 days, but the father made little effort to find him. The theory is that the boy was killed by Mrs. Long in her cellar, and that the father carried the body to the river and hid it in the place where he pretended to first discover it, 10 days later. Mrs. Long is the daughter of Ex-County Judge A. H. Myers.

PHILADELPHIA, 5.—A general fight occurred yesterday afternoon at the corner of Dillwyn and Willow streets, during which several young men were severely injured. The dispute is said to have arisen over politics.

During the encounter, stones were thrown and knives were freely used. James Dougherty was cut several places. Dennis Kelly was cut and kicked about the body. Three men named Baroll, Duffy and Smith were also injured.

INDIANAPOLIS, 5.—A train on the Wabash Pacific and St. Louis railroad, going east, Saturday morning, was boarded at Danville Junction by

four men, who went through one of the passenger cars with drawn revolvers and obtained about \$800 from the affrighted passengers. They left the train suddenly, just as it pulled out, and no trace has been found of them. The same crowd, or a similar one, worked a train on the Indiana, Bloomington and W., which connects at Danville with Wabash, by the pickpocket process, getting \$1,200 and a check for \$1,700 on the First National Bank of Clinton, Ill. The check and an overcoat and a number of pocket books were afterwards found along the side track.

PORTA COSTA, Cala., 5.—A fire yesterday morning destroyed the business portion of the town and eight C. P. carloads of wheat. Loss \$100,000; insurance unknown.

NEW YORK, 5.—A special to the *Post*, from Richmond, says: This morning a disturbance took place in Fredericksburgh, which almost brought about serious trouble. Captain M. Rowe, a prominent white citizen, while discussing the Danville riot, was overheard by a negro named Street, who denounced the statement of the riot as "a funder," (meaning a democratic lie). The negro knocked Rowe down, but Rowe succeeded in getting him off, and beat him pretty soundly. The affair attracted a large crowd of whites and blacks, and for a time serious trouble was anticipated, but was prevented. There is a feverishness in nearly all districts in the State, and fears are entertained that other riots will occur in several places to-morrow, if not to-day. More arms have been sold in the State in the past 10 days than ever before in time of peace, except probably just after the war.

# FOREIGN.

LONDON, 3.—The disorders arising from the hostility of the Orangemen and Nationalists continue and the breaking of windows is general. A Nationalist was stabbed to-day. Rows and beating of persons are frequent on all sides. Revolvers and other weapons are used.

Berlin, 3.—The *Miner* states that a state of siege is proposed for Frankfurt-on-the-Main, in consequence of an explosion in the office of the chief of police.

It is stated that the German government has offered its services to settle the dispute between Russia and Bulgaria, and advised Prince Alexander of Bulgaria not to be so rash in his actions.

It seems he recently threatened to fire upon a schooner for not paying duties levied by the colony. The captain of the vessel hoisted the British flag and was then allowed to depart.

LONDON, 2.—Bishop Thorold, of Rochester, has expressed his hearty approval of the Moody and Sankey mission, and urges clergymen of the Established Church to help it.

John Carver, (Durbyshire), and Company, merchants of this city and Manchester, have failed; liabilities £12,000.

Hong Kong, 3.—Admiral Courbet has assumed command of the French forces at Hanol, and will attack Bachinh with 3,000 men and 30 guns.

Liverpool, 2.—The suspension of Hollinshead, Willey & Co., corn brokers, is bulletined; liabilities probably £100,000.

The government and railway authorities offer a reward of £5,000 each for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons connected with the latest explosion. Physicians say that dynamite must have been used to rupture as it has done the membrane of the tympanum of people injured.

It is reported that Crown Prince Carlos, of Portugal, is about to be betrothed to Arch-Duchess Marie Valeria, the youngest daughter of the Emperor of Austria.

Paris, 2.—The international labor conference is closed.

Henry Broadhurst, member of the English Parliament and honorary president of the conference, telegraphed his friends as follows:

"I think we English have done well. Everything new is in our lines. I never saw men improve as fast as our French colleagues."

Muscat, 2.—Abdul Aziz, brother of the Sultan, who has been besieging the city, has been repulsed and fled.
