LOCAL BRIEFS.

Pardons Postponed.—The monthly meeting of the state board of pardons has been postponed until the 23rd inst.

Preps to Face Footlights.—The preps at the state university met yesterday afternoon, and organized a dramatic association.

Shearing Starts April 18.—Shearing will start at the Milford pens April 18, the total number of sheep to be handled being about 150,000.

The Music of the Band.—The Juvenile band will play this evening, at the reception to be given at the Utah Chamber of Commerce on west Third Street.

Foot Crushed by Cars.—Brakeeman Joseph Albo of the Short Line had his foot crushed by two cars, and was brought to the U. D. S. hospital in this city for treatment.

Lake Still Rising.—The level of the great lake was recorded today at 47-16, about the zero mark, a gain of 2-1/2 of a foot since March 1, and 17-1/2 feet higher than it was a year ago at this time.

Elbow of Mantle Creek.—W. D. Lehman of Mantle has filed application with the state engineer for five second feet of water from Mantle Creek with which to irrigate 400 acres of land.

Death of Eva W. Grey.—A dispatch from New York states the death at the American school in Athens, Greece, of Eva W. Grey, formerly a teacher of Greek at Rowland Hall in this city. She was spending the current academic year in Greece, intending to return to her work here next fall.

Ensign Stake Conference.—The Ensign stake conference convenes tomorrow morning at 10 in the assembly tabernacle at 24th and State. The morning service will be the presence and participation of about 150 children of the Primary associations of the stake, under the direction of Mrs. William M. Stewart, stake president of Primary associations.

Glad Surprise For Judge.—Judge Alfred Budge, of the Fifth district court of Idaho, is in Salt Lake for a few days. Mr. Budge's health or late has been of the best, and his ailment was at first diagnosed as being appendicitis. Upon his arrival here it was determined that such was not the case, however, and his many friends will be pleased to learn that he is improving daily.

R. W. Hartley to Represent Utah.

The local committees on Cecil Rhodes scholarships, Dr. Kingsbury, Prof. Eaton and Dean Cummings, have filled out the papers which elect Robert W. Hartley as the next representative from Utah. Mr. Hartley has as yet decided which college he intends to enter but he intends to specialize in mathematics in one of the larger schools.

New Real Estate Firm.—Articles of incorporation of the W. C. Lehene company of this city have been filed in the county clerk's office. The capital stock of the company is \$50,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. W. C. Lehene is president; W. W. Antiles vice president; Alice R. Lehene, secretary and treasurer. The purpose of the corporation is to conduct a general real estate and investment business.

Broderfollen Konsert.—The Swedish church, "Folkens Konser," last evening, the program consisting of Scandinavian songs. The church auditorium was decorated with the national colors of the United States, Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland. The body members of the church were active in native dances and carried flags corresponding to the same. There was a large attendance. The program was followed by a social and refreshments.

Funeral of Mrs. Super.—Mrs. Norah Brower Super will be buried Sunday, commencing at 1 p. m., from 4150 Third East street. The deceased was born at Hampstead, Queens county, N. Y., Jan. 22, 1828, and was the daughter of Jacob and Phoebe Brower Super. She was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1845. For many years the family kept open house for the elders at Ocean Side, Long Island. Mrs. Super died Thursday evening, March 14, at 10 o'clock, from general debility.

Railroad Provides Teams.—Shippers having to haul goods from the Short Line yards and the transfer of point of shipment from Thirtieth West and State Avenue to First North street, embarking on account of the condition of the roads and the extra distance. To mitigate this, the railroad company has provided additional teams to help the trucks over the hard places, and considerable gravel has been deposited. The move on the part of the company is made necessary by the extensive improvements in progress in the yards.

Garfield via Twelfth South.—Really men are much interested in the location of a railway extension to Garfield Beach. Just at present it is undecided whether the point shall be Twelfth South or Fourteenth South streets; but the engineer of the street railway service is not completing his surveys, and the indications are that the Twelfth South street will be the point of exit. However, the railway authorities are not making any definite statement until the engineer has turned in his report. As soon as the surveyors have done their work, active preparations for construction will be in order.

Laborer's Narrow Escape.—L. C. Colgrave, a laborer, was partially buried in a trench at the rear of the Salt Lake City building, 100 Main street, yesterday afternoon. He was engaged with other men in digging about eight feet below the surface, when the sides of the trench began to cave in. The side was noticed by W. H. Barrett, who had charge of the work, and he shouted a warning to the men. Colgrave was the only one caught, and he was buried to his armpits in clay and gravel. Then a flood of mud and water rushed in upon the imprisoned man, and it looked as though he would be completely buried. But a strong hand was all but covered, when by the strenuous efforts of Mr. Barrett and others he was rescued. Colgrave received no serious injuries.

Hindoo Interpreter.—There will be live examination in this city, April 10, for the position of Hindoo interpreter in the immigration service at San Francisco, at \$600 per annum. Secy. Williams of the local civil service expects such a demand that he indicates at the present time that he will be holding the examination in the United States circuit courtroom, as the job of Hindoo interpreter

seems to be regarded as a soft snap. According to Mark Twain one man who held down the job of Chinese interpreter in the San Francisco police court for years, never knew a word of Chinese. There will also be an examination, set down for the position of cook and carpenter, at \$750 per annum, in the Indian service, at Wahpeton, N. D.

Eiks' Minstrel Show.—The Eiks are making great preparations for the vaudeville and mineral entertainment of the order to be given in the Salt Lake Theater on April 11 next. There are to be 150 people on the stage, including wives and daughters of Eiks; the program being made up and conducted by Maj. R. R. Love of Chicago who has had wide experience in such lines, after rehearsing has begun the instructor dividing the participants to older and younger comedians, pushing preparations. There were over 250 people in attendance on the last Eiks' social reunion which occurred last Thursday night, and proved one of the most entertaining functions the local order has yet given.
