Those at Centennial-Eureka Want Day Wages—Ore Shipments During The Week.

Eureka, Dec. 9.—The Primrose property, owned by D. C. Sullivan, has been leased to George Paxman of Silver City, who has recently sent in a car of ore to the smelter.

About 60 of the "Muckers" employed at the Centennial-Eureka mine have drawn up a petition which they will present to the superintendent asking for a uniform rate of \$2.50 per day.

L. C. Doty, a former Eureka mining man, who has been absent from Eureka for the past three years, has assumed the superintendency of the Bullion Beck mine.

Several capitalists are anxious to secure the ground which is located in the north end of Tintic district, and all probability the property will change hands.

Frank Scappatura and Mrs. Anna Marks have completed the annual assaying work on the Tintic, to put in a pipe line extending 75 miles across the desert.

Considerable development work is being done by the Wassa Mining company on their claims in North Tintic.
