SIX BODIES

Eight or Ten More Probably Are In Ruins of St. George Hotel, San Francisco.

THIRTY PERSONS MISSING.

Two Hundred People Were in Building at Time Fire Started.

Remains of Victims So Charred That Identification is Almost Impossible-Property Loss \$125,000.

San Francisco, April 16 .- Six bodies recovered and probably eight or 10 othses buried in the ruins; six injured, one fatally, and a property loss of ngl.000 are the result of an early mornng fire which destroyed the St. George stel, a lodging house for laborers, at floward and Eighth streets, and eight ecoli buildings.

The hotel was a three-story frame building and lurned so rapidly that home of the 150 guests had time to dress and many escaped by jumping to none of the 180 guests had time to dress and many escaped by jumping to the roof of an adjoining workshop. Scores clambered down the ladders of the firemen and the fire escapes, and at least four jumped to safety into the net held by the fire fighters. STONE WITH MAYA **INSCRIPTIONS FOUND**

Discovered in Yaqui River Valley. Near Esperenza, Mexico, in Giant Cactus Forest.

WITHIN 50 MILES OF NOGALES

Discovery Made by Maj. Fred R. Burnham, Commander of Scotch Forces in Boor War.

Los Angeles, April 16,-Maj. Fred R. Burnham, commander of the Scotch forces of the British army during the Hoor war, who for several weeks in company with Prof. Charles
F. Holder of Pasadena, has been searching for ancient relies in the state of Sonora, Mexico, has discovered an inscription carved in stone in the Yaqui river valley, presumably by the noted Mayas people of Yucatan,
The inscription is probably more than a thousand years old and is of great interest to anthropology. Some pottery of the Mayas was also found on the spot and brought to Pasadena by Prof. Holder, who will torward it to the Smithsonian Institution.

The Mayas were a celebrated people of centuries ago, who attained a considerable degree of civilization in Regrature and art, building beautiful cities and public improvements. CUDAHY PACKING CO. IS INDICTED

For Wholesale Violation of United States Internal Revenue Laws.

FINE ON EACH COUNT \$1,000.

This is Minimum and There Are Seven Hundred and Thirty-Seven Counts.

Topeke, Kansas, April 16 .- The Cudahy Packing company of Kansus jury here today for wholesale violations of the United States internal revenue laws. The charge is that the company has defrauded the government out of over \$89,000 in revenues on eleomargarine. The corporation was indicted on 727 counts and the maximum fine on each count is \$1,000 making a total for which the comapn; is liable in the event of conviction of over \$700,000,

The revenue law provides that each pound of uncolored ofcomargarine must bear a revenue stamp of a quar-ter of a cent but that each pound to which coloring material has been addd to give it the appearance of butter to cent revenue stamp must be at

It is charged in the indictments that the Cudaby Packing company has sold the colored product under the quarter of a cent tax and consequently has defrauded the government out of large

defrained the government out of large sams.

Inspectors have been working on the case several months and have secured samples sold in towas and cities from New York to Seattle and from Duluth to Jacksonville. Fla. These were forwarded to the government chemist who reported that every sample contained coloring material and this evidence was turned over to Dist. Atty J. H. Bone at Topeka, who submitted the facts to the grand jury.

Every sample now in the hands of the government experts bears the identification mark of the inspector who purchased it as well as the analysis which shows that it contains colorsing matter.

succeeded in monopolising the oleomargarine market by selling the colored product and paying the tax on the

While this criminal action will be prosecuted Dist Atty. Bone says it does not end the matter. He will bring a civil action against the company to have the plant and machinery used in the manufacture of alcomagazine confiscated. This proceeding will also be commenced in the federal court. The elementarine manufacturing plant is connected with the Cudahy Packing establishment in Kansas City, Kansas.

H. J. Bone, United States district atterney, said to a representative of the Associated Press this afternoon:
