I feel great pride that ho imputation of fraud has ever been seriously uttared against members of the republican party in any State or district. The pool rooms have also been closed until after the presidential context is settled, by order of Mayor Fulton, as betting is calculated to keep up the excitement and partisan feeling.

In their rounds they paid a visit to the resi-dence of Rev. Mr. Mills, a senior in the college and an ordained minister, who has been a conspicuous advocate of the prohibition cause. The mo-ment the charavari began in front of his house, he fired four shots from a revolver into the crowd, one of which slightly wounded a student named Mitchell, piercing the edge of his ear and grazing the side of his head. Mills was arrested and put under \$100 bail for trial to-morrow. The feeling against him is reported strong.


