THREATENING.—Towards evening yesterday clouds gathered overhead and darkened the sky, and the indications seemed favorable for a genuine shower, but the parched inhabitants, the thirsty ground and the dry vegetation were doomed to disappointment; for the expected shower did not turn out even a drizzle, but was an unqualified "fizzle," only a few tantalizing drops falling.

FOR HIS HEALTH.—W. A. Hudson, Esq., of the firm of Hudson Bros., produce commission merchants, 212 North Street, St. Louis, and family are spending a few months in the city and vicinity, for the benefit of his health, and, judging from the present personal appearance of Mr. H., we should say his sojourn is having a beneficial effect upon him. We wish himself and family a pleasant time during their stay.

COLD.—We are informed that nights are quite cold in Parley's Park. Water left standing in vessels in the open air is covered with ice in the morning.

DENVER.—Mr. Byron Groo, who lately visited Denver for the purpose of bringing the escaped prisoner Beggan from there to this city, informs us that he was much surprised at finding the capital of Colorado so fine a city as it is. The town is nicely laid out in small blocks, probably about one fourth as large as those of this City, and the principal residences are generally surrounded by small but nicely cultivated flower patches. There is an agreeable absence of dust on the streets, the ground upon which the city is built being of a light gravelly nature. There is an air, Mr. Groo says, of neatness and cleanliness about Denver that is very pleasing. The impression is heightened by all of the buildings being of brick, and the principal ones being of improved styles of architecture. Denver boasts a very pleasant and necessary adjunct to every large and well regulated city, a fine public park. It is also lighted with gas and has magnificent water works.

Mr. Groo visited the Greeley colony, and as it is a very pleasant place. The settlement there have about 100,000 acres of land under cultivation, immediately surrounding the town, which is watered from the river Cache la Poudre. Along the banks of the river is a splendid growth of timber. The climate of Colorado is most healthful, even in the hot season. There being an absence of malarial in this section, and the nights are invariably cool in summer. There is another colony, composed for the most part of people from Boston and St. Louis, who have about 50,000 acres of land under cultivation. When Mr. Groo arrived in Denver he found the object of his search and the cause of his visit, Jack Beggan, in jail, serving out a term of imprisonment in lieu of payment of a fine of \$50 for abusing a man and beating him over the head with a six shooter. If Beggan is not a hard case, who is?

PUTTING UP THEIR WORKS.—The following came to-day by W. U. Tel. line.

Stockton, Utah, 23.—H. S. Jacobs & Co. started up their works to-day. The machinery runs splendidly. They are taking a solid chunk out of the iron mine, with tactics, which weigh over a ton, and easy over five thousand dollars. There are lively times in Stockton to-day.

CALLED.—We had a call to-day from Mr. J. H. Eccles, furniture dealer of Ogden, who recently returned from a trip east, where he has been to purchase all kinds of bedding and furniture for the Utah market. Mr. Eccles visited some of the principal manufacturers in the east, and saw their methods of doing business and the latest improvements in machinery for the manufacture of furniture; and his opinion is that before our home manufacturers can hope to cope successfully with their eastern competitors they must adopt their methods of doing business and improve their machinery as they see it.

A SCENE.—There was somewhat of a scene in the police Court yesterday. It appears that a foreign Doctor of rather alternative nature has several times lately endeavored to take liberties with the chambermaid who attended to his room. It happened yesterday that the wife of one of the male employees of the hotel was em-

gaged to assist in the house work. When it was time to arrange the little Doctor's room the chambermaid requested the married lady to attend to it, giving as an excuse for not doing so herself, that she did not wish to, as the inmate of the room was a mean man. When the lady entered the room the little Doctor immediately commenced to tell her how "avert" she looked, and took hold of her and kissed her. At this time somebody came to the door of the room and asked the Doctor if he was going out, to which he replied that he was not ready. He then took hold of the lady again, but she got away from him and ran to her husband and told him. The latter immediately fetched an officer and had the Doctor arrested, and the above was brought out in the evidence.
