

# ONE VICTIM DEAD FORTY-NINE HURT

Yesterday's Wreck on Salt Lake  
Route More Serious Than  
First Reported.

Coast Bound Train Failed to Stop at  
Boulder For Orders—Official  
Tele to be Used.

## CHEW SHES WRECK IS COMING.

The crew on the local train saw the  
other train approaching as they  
emerged from a deep cut on the Tropic  
Junction side. Both the engineer and  
fireman jumped, and escaped with  
slight injuries. Not so with the crew on  
No. 1. The engine and car ran into  
the approaching local too late, and after  
reversing the lever and throwing on  
the air there was no time left to jump, with  
the result that Engineer Leavitt and  
Fireman Sullivan were caught in the  
crush and suffered serious injuries,  
although it is hoped they will not result  
fatally. Both men stuck to their  
posts, and were picked up from among  
the debris when the rescuing crew  
began its work.

The accident happened just as most  
of the passengers on the train were  
emerging from their berths preparatory to going into the diner for breakfast. Some, however, had not arisen,  
and these received, in almost every case,  
injuries on the top of their heads and  
twisted backs. From the force of the  
impact of the trains throwing them  
against the berth partitions, a per-  
centage of the passengers said that no  
one in the smoking car was killed, and in one in the tourist car back of  
the smoker, while the chair car back of  
that received injuries of a serious character.

The fifth car, a tourist sleeper, contained  
the passengers who received the worst injuries, and only a few of  
these were of a dangerous nature. The  
passengers in the standard sleepers  
were hardly scratched.
