### DEATH OF MISS LILIAN SHAW

The Estimable and Talented Daughter of Robert R. Shaw.

D. K. Smith Injured in a Fall from his Bike—Pioneer Day Festivities at Lester Park and Elsewhere.

Miss Lilian Shaw, one of Ogden's most accomplished and popular young ladies, died yesterday, July 22nd, at 10:30 a. m. of spinal meningitis.

Miss Shaw was the daughter of ex-Captain of Police Robert R. Shaw, and her mother, Mrs. Shaw, was born in Ogden City on February 17th, 1873, and has lived here with her parents up to the time of her death. She was stricken down with the disease, which caused her death, on May 13th, last, and after being some time from it; partially recovered and was able to go out again at the beginning of the month, but had a relapse on July 9th, and continued to grow weaker until the angel of death came to her relief on the great beyond yesterday morning.

Miss Shaw was a bright young lady, possessing many talents. She was a graduate of the Ogden High School in 1891, and in 1892 she was elected a position as teacher in the Ogden public schools, and has since that time taught the primary grades of the Five Points school, where she was beloved by her students and all who knew her, because of her kind, lovable disposition. She was a member of the Ogden High School Alumni, and that association will attend the funeral in a body. Miss Shaw was a talented artist, a number of her beautiful paintings have been on exhibition in the city at different times. Her last study was exhibited in Burt Bros. show window a few weeks ago, a life size painting of a young maiden.

Her death is a severe shock to her parents, she being their only child, and as her mother is a widow, the loss is a heavy one. The funeral services will be held in the Third ward meeting house on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Services will be taken from her late residence, No. 1342 Washington avenue, on date of funeral, from 10 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Friends invited.
