RIGHT THROUGH.

Special Was Late So the Proposed Trip to Salt Lake Was Abandoned.

PROF. JENKS IS WITH THEM.

Will Have Conference With President Roosevelt and Then Go on to New York.

Owing to the late arrival of the special train bearing the imperial Chinese commissioners, Tuan Fang and Tai Hunz Tzen and suites in Ogden last evening, the visit to Salt Lake was abandoned and the train went right on east over the Union Pacific. The next stop will be at Lincoln, Neb., whence they continue on to Chicago, arriving on Friday morning.

Accompanying the party is Prof. W.

J. Jenks of Cornell university, who went to San Francisco to meet steamer and escort the distinguished visitors across the continent as special representative of President Roosevelt. The party is traveling in a special train carrying its own dining car, and all other modern conveniences. From San Francisco to Ogden S. N. Wood, city ticket agent at 'Frisco, was in charge of the train, but when the train continued east at midnight A. B. Moseley of the Oregon Short Line act-ed as "chaperone."
