WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Sumner offered the following as an amendment to the rule: That all treaties with foreign powers be considered as to proceeding in the Senate, unless submitted in special conference by the President, or ordered otherwise by a special vote of the Senate.

Conkling submitted an amendment by adding: And all other matter hereafter known as executive business. The amendment was ordered printed.

White and Sumner returned to the Senate at 12 o'clock and stay till 5 o'clock. Harlan's motion was agreed to by a vote of 29 against 20.

Harlan moved to go into executive session, in order that the majority may come to a conclusion as to proceeding in the Senate before them. The question was disagreed to.

Sumner moved to strike out the words "confined in the common jail," carried by 31 to 27.

NEW YORK.

Accidents—Another railroad to Ogden arrested while at supper—Shells falling in air over Paris.

NEW YORK, N.Y.—A correspondent telegraphed from Paris, last evening that, on Tuesday night, the police authorities of the Hotel de Ville, with a party of francs tireurs, descended upon the boulevard, and arrested a hundred and fifty men and women, who were there supping luxuriously. The officers were that such extravagance was not in keeping with the times. Among those arrested were a number of well-known persons, whom it has been determined to punish for neglecting duty as civil commissaries.

This is for the purpose of preventing military dictatorship which the Communists will end in the return of the Imperial dynasty of Napoleon to the throne.

Shells are falling over all parts of

the City and great fear is manifested, by the Communist authorities, of a revolutionary attack upon the Hotel de Ville. The guard around the building has been doubled. A reactionary movement is imminent, and it is believed that the explosion formed a part of the conspiracy against the Communists.

A special dispatch from Versailles, says that last night a large body of men advanced from their works in front of the ramparts of Paris and attempted to surprise the great fort of Montmartre. They were promptly met by the troops, and, after a sharp struggle, they were routed by a bayonet charge and driven back to Paris, leaving many of their number, dead and wounded.

The destruction of the column Vendôme, by the Communists of Paris, has created great indignation in military circles here, and it is regarded, by the soldiers, as a direct insult to the army.

A dispatch from Berlin, last evening, says there was a stormy discussion in the German Reichstag, on the right of members to inquire into the actions of the government. The liberals were vehement in demanding their right. This is the first conflict between the German parliament and the government since the Rastenburg incident.

The Southern members are exceedingly suspicious and speak their mind plainly and with energy. The Reichstag has three days to go. There will be no Wisconsin holiday.

New York, 18, London 18.—A Times special dispatch says the Communists have resolved to form a central club. The women are disarming. Rumors are afloat that the delegation of the accommodation decreases houses of ill-fame shall be closed.

The Daily News says there is great agitation and distrust in the Communists. Arrests are becoming frequent. It is supposed that the Germans are about sending an ultimatum to the Communists. There are heavy columns near Passy, where a battle is hourly expected.

The Telegraph special dispatch says 10,000 insurgents attempted on Tuesday to surprise Montmartre, but were driven back. It is reported that the Versailles have carried the Montmartre position. The rebels have been obtained in the Fort case, and the panel is now exhausted. The court has adjourned till to-morrow morning, when a panel will be ready, to select the remaining jurors from among the remaining jurors.

BINGHAMPTON.—Edward H. Roloff was hanged at 11:30 a.m., to-day, and met his death with the same nerve he has exhibited from the hour of his arrest.

New York.—Nothing can be accomplished with certainty as to the Erie matters, but the general supposition on the street is that the Erie, thinking they will have to return to thirty thousand shares to the English holders, are now trying to purchase them, as they have been quickly thrown into the market.

The consequence of the increased demand is a rise in the price of stock.

In the General Sessions Court, this morning, in the case of the notorious Dr. Lookup Evans, rendered a verdict of assault on Ann O'Neill, and attempted manslaughter in the second degree.

The Attorney General, Sullivan, called for the full penalty on Evans, as a man who, for years, had led a life of infamous criminality. Judge Bedford expressed his astonishment at twelve men, supposed to be intelligent, remaining out all night after such clear evidence. From eight years experience in that court he believed Evans the most consummate villain ever convicted there. He hoped all professional abortionists would take heed that neither their ill gotten gains or alleged great influence would avail them in that court. His Honor then sentenced Evans to three years and six months in the State Prison, with hard labor; the full penalty.

Another juror was obtained this morning on the Foster murder trial, making the tenth.

CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, 18.—The Tucson Arizonas says the Pima Indians killed twenty-eight Apaches and captured seven in the Pima mountains, May 18. The prisoners are being held at the war path, and had been receiving rations at Camp Grant.

Isaac Ritter, a passenger on the emigrant train westward, was killed instantly while crossing the work of the Santa Fe, on the C. P. R. R., last night.

George W. Griffith, a farmer of Yolo, was thrown under a wagon wheel, at Sacramento, and killed yesterday.

The sale of the country title lands, in the vicinity of Bonaville, by auction to-day, was poorly attended. The greater portion was sold to the Bonaville Land and Ferry Co., at \$40 to \$400 per block. The total sales aggregated only \$250,000.

Col. H. C. Whitely, chief of the secret service division of the treasury department, and E. C. Bonfield, solicitor of the treasury, arrived here to-night.

The disclosure of the arrangements for the construction of an extension of the California Pacific Railroad to Ogden, created much comment here. The enterprise is generally received with great favor.

The women's suffrage had thirteen female and twenty-one male delegates in attendance to-day. They have called for the police to maintain order this evening.

FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.

PARIS, 18.—The committee of safety appeals to the nation to secure triumph, describing the fearful results if they do not. The late attack on Nemilly was repulsed. Montmartre is being bombarded by the Prussian batteries. The Prussians are generally received with great favor.

VENEZUELA, 18.—The candidates on the approaches continue.

The committee on the treaty of peace, proposes to the Assembly an exchange of territory in the neighborhood of Metz for that of Belfort.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, 18.—The Times special from Paris says six hundred persons were killed by the explosion near the Avenue de Trocadero last night, most of them women.

The Communist Official Journal accuses the Versailles of causing the outside explosion. The Paris demonstrates that the explosion was solely the result of accident. No shell had fallen in the Champ de Mars at the time of the explosion.

The Prussians are cutting fascines between Rastenburg and Belfort. It is expected they will make an attack on the east side of Paris soon.

A report has been introduced, it is said, in Turkey, to issue thirty millions of fresh consols.
