WASHINGTON.

More Ku Klux Arrested.

WASHINGTON, 9.—A Spartansburg (S. C.) letter says that eleven Ku Klux were arrested last Friday night. All who could give good bonds have been admitted to bail and are making preparations for their trial.

Indian Policy.

Delegates McCormick of Arizona who have been in consultation during the week with President Grant, General Sherman, the secretary of war and secretary of the interior, is understood to say that the new programme for the control of the Indians in Arizona will be satisfactory to his constituents. It strictly adhered to, and General Cook is sustained in his dealing with hostile Indians. The fifth cavalry is ordered to Arizona to relieve the Third and will proceed there at once.

Mr. McCormick has protested against certain acts of Collier during his visit to Arizona, and says he is satisfied that they were not authorized and are not approved by the President. He denies that there was any purpose on the part of his constituents to mislead Collier, and says they do not wish for war measures an hour before the election is necessary to convince the Apaches that they must cease their robberies and murders. The Arizona object, however, to the assertion that these Indians are honest and peaceably disposed or ever have been.

NEW YORK.

Various.

NEW YORK, 9.—A swindler named Charles J. Wittington, from 34 John St., New York, has been sending circulars to London, offering counterfeit notes of the Bank of England at low rates. The police magistrate telegraphed the facts to New York, and Theodore B. Broun, leader of the gang of bunco and back pay claim forgers, was arrested here last eve. It is said he manipulated the forged claim on the government amounting to four hundred thousand dollars. His headquarters have lately been in Chicago.

General Barlow, the newly elected attorney general of the State, says that criminal proceedings shall be immediately commenced against every man implicated in the city frauds; he says that we can now easily rid ourselves of all corrupt officials. The mayors, the commissioners of different boards, the judges in the inferior courts and the judges of higher courts will be reached by impeachment. A new city charter will be framed and a new election be ordered.

Deputy comptroller Green says that the result of the election is already felt in the improved price of city bonds, and there will be no trouble in raising any amount of money stated.

Sigel will make O'Donovan Rossa deputy register.

NEW YORK, 9.—A mass meeting of the tax payers in Brooklyn is called for to-morrow night to express indignation at the ring frauds alleged to have been perpetrated in the election.

Tweed has not resigned and will not. He was at the office this afternoon and will take his seat in the senate. O'Donovan Rossa will, however, contest the seat on the ground of illegal voting and false canvassing, to prove which he wants to have plenty of witnesses.

McMahon, reformer, will contest Blair's seat in the assembly and Killian will contest Frear's.

Tweed will be ready with a reply to Judge Larned's warrant.

It is rumored this afternoon that Mayor Hall intends to resign before the organization of the new municipal board.

OHIO.

Fugitive Liberated.

CINCINNATI, 9.—A St. Paul (Minn.) special says that the U. S. Court discharged the fugitive general, O'Neill and Corley on the grounds that although an offense was clearly established, no proof was adduced that the expedition was organized in Minnesota.

MINNESOTA.

Election.

ST. PAUL, 9.—Partial returns from thirty-nine counties give Austin a majority of 5,535. The portions of the State yet to be heard from are Republican and will swell the majority considerably.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

More Arrests.

COLUMBIA, 9.—Several arrests have been made at the Union conference by the U. S. marshal and more will be made. The feeling is very bitter and

it would not be surprising if bloodshed should ensue.

## ILLINOIS.

A Governor Rebuked by a Judge.

CHICAGO, 9.—Judge Williams, of the criminal court in this city, in his charge to the grand jury to-day, referred to the cases of homicide which came before them, and in this connection warned them against being influenced by anyone not of their number in finding indictments, and referred to published letters purporting to come from the governor, in which he was charged with general and district attorney, calling attention to certain parties, such as general Sheridan, mayor Mason, F. F. Sherman and others, and cautioned them particularly not to allow themselves to be influenced by and to pay no attention to them. This portion of the judge's charge was carefully worded, but conveyed a severe rebuke to the governor for his course in the Grosvore tragedy.

Government Buildings to be Re-built.

Superior architect Mallet of the treasury department in the city and informs them that the government will proceed early in the spring to re-build the government buildings destroyed by fire upon the old site, and the plan is to secure the entire block and make the buildings large enough to accommodate all the U. S. officers of every kind, including the courts.

FOREIGN NEWS.

PRUSSIA.

Extensive Labor Strikes.

BERLIN, 9.—Extensive strikes are reported in Elbing, an important port of Eastern Prussia, noted for manufacturing, especially for sugar refineries and woolen factories.

FRANCE.

Terrible Explosion.—Compulsory Military Service and Education.

PARIS, 9.—A terrible explosion occurred in a coal mine near St. Etienne while the gangs were at work. Some men have been recovered alive, twenty-two bodies taken out and thirty miners are still in the pit. It is agreed that the explosion was caused by fire damp. In the general council of Cure yesterday minister Poncier Querier said that Thiers, who had been opposed to making military service obligatory, was beginning to yield before the necessity of such a measure to bring the army up to the proper standard of military strength.

The general councils of departments throughout the country are considering the subject of compulsory education. Several have already adopted the system, many have declared in favor of it, and there is good reason to believe that it will eventually accept and carry it into practical operation.

CREAT BRITAIN.

Lord Mayor's Show.

LONDON, 9.—The Lord Mayor's speech, with the usual display and procession to Westminster Hall, took place to-day.

The festivities of the day closed with the usual banquet given by the Lord Mayor at the Guild Hall, which was attended by a brilliant company of ministers, members of parliament, ambassadors and other distinguished persons. Among the guests were Gladstone with several members of the Cabinet and Schenck, the American minister. The toast to the diplomatic corps was responded to by Mr. Schenck, who in the course of his remarks made grateful and feeling allusion to the English sympathy with Chicago in their great calamity. This speech was loudly and significantly applauded. Gladstone replied to the toast of His Majesty's government. He said that England had no quarrel, feud or controversy with any nation on earth. Peace was never so certain as now. He referred to the sentiments of friendship expressed by the American minister, and said that in adding the suffering people of Chicago, Englishmen had remembered that America had been equally ready to pour out her wealth for the relief of England. He spoke of the treaty of Washington as the most remarkable triumph of civilization, which may possibly lead to peaceable arbitration of all disputes between nations. England has little fear from outward troubles, and the international society causes her no uneasiness.

Editor Deseret News:—Dear Brother

—We number now in this branch (the Brookfield branch) 37 altogether, 5 elders, 3 prelates, 3 teachers and 30 members. We are in good standing, with the exception of three members. Fifteen members of this branch emigrated to Utah this season, leaving here on the 5th of July last, and arriving at Salt Lake City on the 23rd of the same month. We have had a few visits by Bro. Wm. Legg, who has been laboring about Vienna, Trumbull County, Ohio. But he has now returned to mount his home in Utah, and we are left alone without any elder from Zion. Some more elders were appointed to missions in the States, at the last Semi-Annual Conference at Salt Lake City; we hope we shall have a visit from some of them ere long, for there is a large field here open for preaching the gospel. We are striving to preach the gospel and bear our testimony at every opportunity, and we once in a while get a candidate for baptism. But as a general thing the people harden their hearts against the gospel, and will take no heed to the testimonies and warnings of the elders. And it seems to me that the poor will remain as they are until the judgments of the Almighty awaken them out of their dormant condition. But it remains for us to do all in our power to warn them of the judgments that are coming upon them, so that our garments may be clean from their blood, and they be left without excuse in the day to come.

We should be glad to receive a visit from any of the elders appointed to missions in the States, at any time, to aid us in warning the people of the destruction that hangs over their heads, and to point out to them the way of escape from these calamities, and also to stimulate us to remain faithful in the good work.

We hold two meetings on Sundays regularly, at two and six o'clock, p.m., and one meeting on Wednesday evening at seven o'clock. And we invite our neighbors and friends to come to hear us, but they would rather give heed to the lying reports that are going the rounds of the papers continually against us, than listen to the principles that would elevate them, if they would practice them.

Hoping soon to see some of the elders from Zion here amongst us, and ever

praying for the welfare and prosperity of Zion, I remain, your Brother in the gospel covenant,
