The case of Hetty Green, the woman charged with shop lifting, has been transferred to Justice of the Peace Frank H. Wright. The matter came up before Judge D. W. Steele, but upon motion of her attorney, the court granted a change of venue.

Twenty-five citizens of Porter avenue, Ogden, were serenaded Sunday afternoon over the telephone line from this city by a local musician, who used a horn for the purpose. The wire carried the volume so well that the instrument was heard all over a large room.

The old Stephenites here have all been gathered into the new Seventh Street school and are being sent up two at a time to the construction department of Second East street to be fitted into double truck cars after the local standard type.

A. Gray, died yesterday at her home in this city from dropsy, after a period of several months. Her deceased husband was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, where she was born Jan. 7, 1871. She has been a resident of this city for nearly 20 years. The funeral will be held from the Eastern mortuary, same place as the south State Street street tomorrow. Wednesday, at 2 p.m. Friends are invited.

Lee Neville of Randolph, aged 11, was brought to St. Mark's hospital yesterday for an operation on his throat. He was placed in front of an X-ray machine and it was discovered he had a tumor in his esophagus for 14 days was removed. The boy had been living on liquid nourishment, and the local doctors were unable to do anything. He was brought to the hospital on Saturday, and then brought to this city for treatment. The child, when removed, was badly discolored.

Two brothers whose lives have been bound up in each other for years have died within 24 hours of each other and will be buried together tomorrow at 1 p.m. in front of D. Evans' undertaking parlor. The one was Peter and Alexander Brings, two Scotchmen who came to this country a number of years ago and lived together on West Third South street. Peter was taken with stonecutter's consumption a week ago, and almost at the same time Alexander, who worked at the same place, died Sunday, and the brother followed him yesterday. The men have a sister in Scotland, but no relatives in this country.

There was an assault committed on some Second Street last night about 10 o'clock, and for the moment no location through which it may be done. A man stepped down stairs from a rooming house bearing a big club in his hand. He dashed up the street in pursuit of two men, who were walking leisurely. He struck the man in the face with a heavy blow on the shoulder with the club. At this moment a drunken man interfered and seized the club. No arrests were made, although McCann was apparently flogged.
