LOCAL BRIEFS.

Survive on City Creek.—The snow up City Creek canyon, well on toward the divide, is said by parties who have just been up there, to be 12 feet deep.

Death of Mrs. Cheshire.—Mrs. Bessie B. Cheshire, widow of the late W. W. Cheshire, died yesterday at 11:30 a. m. at her home at Washington, D. C.

Pay Day Friday.—The 150 teachers, supervisors and principals in the public schools will be paid on Friday next. Some \$24,000 will be distributed.

Address to Educators.—Chairman Henderson of the board of Education will address the principals and supervisors of the public schools tomorrow afternoon.

Died of Heart Disease.—Miss Lorrain E. Haysinger of Denver, died yesterday of heart disease at 11:30 a. m. and was shipped this afternoon, to Denver for interment.

Miss Alder in Hospital.—Miss Dean C. Alder, daughter of George D. Alder of this city, a student at the Agricultural college at Logan, is in the hospital at D. S. hospital recovering from an operation for appendicitis.

Successors to Paralysis.—Mrs. Libby Garfield, wife of W. K. Garfield, died at her home, 225 Seventh avenue, yesterday, of paralysis of the heart. She was 45 years old, and was survived by her husband and a daughter, Evelyn, 17 years old. Mrs. Garfield was a native of St. Louis, and she came west about 19 years ago.

Eulogy for Debs.—Mrs. M. Tupper, the national lecturer of the Socialist party, who spoke last evening at the Packard hall on "Socialism—What it is and how it could be introduced," said, among other things, that Eugene O. Debs has a closer place in the hearts of the American people than any other man in the United States today.

The prizes for 500 and high five were hand-painted china pieces and were won by Lillian Smith, Mrs. W. Jenkins, A. M. Perkins and M. Sherman.

"Rushed the Car."—George W. Cobb of the Sanitary Car company of New York, who is visiting here, was "rushed the car" last night, where the subject of canning was pretty well discussed. Addresses were made by Mayor A. L. Brewer of Ogden, Col., and Joseph Geoghegan of this city, and others.

DR. E. G. GOWANS IS RE-APPOINTED

He Remains Judge of the Salt Lake Juvenile Court for Another Term.

MAJOR BREEDEN SECRETARY.

He Has Judicial Power Over All the Juvenile Courts Throughout the State.

Dr. E. G. Gowans was re-appointed judge of the Salt Lake Juvenile court, which is designated under the new law as the Third judicial district, yesterday when the juvenile court commission, which consists of Governor William H. Fry, Sup. of State Schools A. C. Nelson and Attorney-General Albert R. Barnes, met and organized.

Major M. A. Breeden, who was a candidate for the judgeship, was appointed secretary of the commission, which is the most important position. He has judicial power over all the courts throughout the state and has the authority to organize juvenile courts.

Although the salaries of these officers were not decided upon yesterday, it is understood that each will draw \$1,800 a year. Major Breeden's traveling expenses will be allowed while making tours of the state in the interest of the state.

A. A. Noon of Provo was reappointed judge of the Fourth judicial district, and H. A. Pedersen of Logan was reappointed judge of the first judicial district. The judges in Provo and Logan will receive, it is understood, \$750 a year.

Two candidates for the judgeship of Ogden have applied to the commission. They are the present incumbent, Judge Volney C. Howell and A. H. Patton. The Ogden judge will probably draw a salary of \$1,200 a year.

The commission will meet again Thursday, when the judge of the Ogden court will be appointed and the salaries of the various judges and secretaries will be fixed.

Judge Gowans was supported by the club women of the city, to whom effort was largely due his re-appointment. He has given up his entire time to the juvenile court work and has been reading law for some time to qualify for hearing jury cases which are provided for under the new law.

Judge Gowans gave up a large medical practice to take up the work of the juvenile court. He studied the needs of the boys and girls who come under his care, morally and physically, from a scientific standpoint.

T. L. Irvine, a former deputy sheriff, was selected for the clerk of the juvenile court of this county by County Clerk Margaret Zane Wytcher. Irvine's salary will be decided upon later.
