

New York, 9. The Superintendent of Police, Kennedy, has ordered the enforcement of an almost absorute Sunday law, which prohibits the sale or exposure to sale of any goods on Sunday, except by those Jews whose business is closed on Saturday. All restaurants, cigar shops and drug stores are to be closed on Sunday. The Times states that 1,155 persons were killed in the riots of 1863, of whom



New York, 10.

Chief Justice Chase had nothing whatever to do with the issue of the habeas corpus writ in the Jeff Davis case, his name being attached as a mere matter of form. The commander of Fortress Monroe will put the prisoner in the hands of the U.S. Marshal, who will be held responsible for his custody. Davis will be furnished rooms at the Spottiswood Hotel, Richmond, until after the hearing of the return to the writ, thus the government does not release its hold upon the prisoner. The matter of bail has not been thought of, and the case is one merely as to why the government holds the prisoner. The report that Chief Justice Chase is to go to Richmond is unfounded; he knew nothing of the issue of the writ in the Davis case until after its issue.

The Herald's Ft. Larned special, dated the 9th, states that Hancock's operations on the Smoky Hill route have Nearly all the tailor shops in Paris driven the southern Cheyennes north; they are moving in four war parties, and struck the South Platte road bebefore last, and burned two ranches. with the Indians here. Messengers from the north have arrived and state that large numbers of Indians desire to come in and make peace, Red Cloud included. Numerous war parties are on the road between here and Fort Phil.

Earl Derby stated in Parliament, last night, that he considered the peace of Europe no longer a question of doubt. London, 10.

In the House of Commons a division took place on the amendment made by the Government in the reform bill, and the amendment was adopted.

The Hon. H. S. Walpole, Home Secretary, has resigned.

Paris, 10.

The new France and American telegraph Co., which proposes to lay an electric cable between Brest and Halifax, is promised support and assistance by the Imperial Government.

The Hon. Gathorne Hardy is appointed Home Secretary, in place of Walpole. The Earl of Devon replaces Mr. Hardy as chairman of poor law board.

The bullion in the bank of England has decreased £119,000.

New York, 10.

Charles Chaffee, a New Jersey farmer, sailed in the last steamer for California, accompanied by Thomas Pierce and wife; and leaving a wife and children behind; Chaffee buys Pierce's wife for \$6,000, deliverable in California.
