SUPERINTENDENCY OF INDIAN AFFAIRS,  
G. S. L. City, U. T., Jan. 25, 1865.

## NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

THAT under an order of the President of the United States, dated October 3d, 1861, the "Entire portion of the valley of the Uintah River within Utah Territory, extending on both sides of said river to the crest of the first range of contiguous mountains on each side," was directed to be set apart as an Indian reservation.

That, by the provisions of an act of Congress, approved May 5th, 1864, (see chapter 77 of the Laws of 1864, Pamphlet, page 63) the Uintah Valley reservation is "Set apart for the permanent settlement and exclusive occupation of such of the different tribes of Indians of Utah Territory as may be induced to inhabit the same."

Therefore, notice is hereby given under instructions of the Department of the Interior, transmitted to me through the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, "that all white settlers must forthwith remove from the Uintah Reservation," and that on the opening of Spring, "all persons found therein unlawfully," "that is, without a license to trade, a passport, or permission of the proper Indian authorities, will be removed," and that the laws of the United States, applicable to Indian Reservations, will be enforced.
