

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

SKELETON FOUND.—The Territorial Enterprise of the 8th inst., contains the following:

"On Saturday last while some miners were at work near the Sacramento mine, high up on Cedar Hill, they unearthed the skeleton of a man. The skull was gone but most of the other bones with a lot of rags of decayed clothing were found lying together in a heap, covered with rocks and rubbish. As to who the man was who perished in such a place, all is conjecture. The only clue that can ever lead to any discovery in regard to the remains is an embryo picture in a good state of preservation, of a middle aged lady and gentleman seated side by side, which picture is now in the possession of Coroner Symons. Numbers who have looked at the picture say that the face of the man seemed quite familiar to them. Had the man fallen in a fit or suffered any death but a violent one, the body would have remained exposed and must have been seen by some one of the many men almost daily ranging about over the hill. He could not have died and then covered his body over with rocks as they say it was found—he could as easily have carried away his own head and secreted it."

MORE MARI DELINQUENTS.—We are in receipt of a letter, of Wednesday's date, from Mr. G. Goddard, of this city, stating that last Monday night week he mailed a letter here for Battle Creek, and that on the following Friday it had not reached its destination; another letter, posted the same time, and for the same place, by a friend of his, also missed. It seems as if these continued irregularities are the effect of pre-concerted action of some parties who have the supervision of the mails, or the many complaints that have been made of late would have led, ere this, to the rectification of the evil. We hope that postmasters everywhere in the Territory will keep us posted as long as these irregularities continue and we will ventilate the subject until the evil is remedied.

JOINT BENEFIT.—Kate Danin and Mr. Wilson will receive a joint farewell benefit previous to their departure, when we expect these favorite and popular actors will have a substantial proof of the appreciation the public have for them and for their talents. THE CULLOM BILL.—The Gold Hill News of the 8th inst., speaking of the Cullom bill, says:

"This bill, we are credibly informed, was drawn in Salt Lake, and it has a meaning which will not be misunderstood by intelligent men. It means, in case such a law shall ever pass, and the attempt shall be made to execute it, the desolation of Utah at the hands of a people who will prove themselves as desperate in destroying their own works in Utah as they were brave and self-sacrificing in building it up."

THROWN FROM A HORSE.—This afternoon about half-past two, a man named O'Hara, who has been engaged in a livery stable in town, was thrown from a horse on East Temple street, opposite the post office, and was badly stunned. As he was for some time insensible, it was feared his neck was broken, but he recovered after a time.

"UNNATURAL CRIME."—The Sacramento Union of the 8th inst. contains a letter from its Utah correspondent, a considerable portion of which is devoted to the present movement in the Legislative assembly of this Territory, in favor of woman suffrage.

A reference to this letter, in the editorial columns of the Union, says:

"Should the ladies generally vote to sustain polygamy, as one might be led to suppose they will from the speeches at the Female Polygamic Convention held in Salt Lake city, the fact may be pressed with some force against the passage of the Cullom bill or any other now before Congress for ridding the Territory of that most unnatural crime."

We fail to see the force of the last expression. Laws may be passed making it a penal offense for a man to marry more wives than one, but to urge that such an act is a crime at all when judged by the acknowledged standard of the Christian world, the Bible, and least of all an *unnatural* crime, is simply ridiculous. We gave the Union credit for a much larger share of good sense than such an opinion deserves.
