FRAGMENTS.

The grand jury has been in session today. The county court later issued a warrant for the arrest of Wm. H. Hill, Dr. and Mrs. L. Smith, Dr. Miller and Dr. Jonathan.

Constituents Lester and his staff are holding a meeting today. The grand jury is over.

In the courts today, with the exception of the Hamlin case, there was nothing of note.

Eight More Indictments.

This morning, about 8 o'clock, a couple of students were driving towards town in a cart on the State road about four miles south of the city. The approaching street car frightened the horse, which ran a short distance and emitted with a heavy ice wagon. The young men were thrown out and the cart was dashed to pieces. The riders did not appear to be hurt beyond a few bruises.

COUNCIL DOINGS.

Heber M. Wells Appointed a Member of the Board of Public Works.

REFUNDING OF SEWER TAXES.

Extension of Time granted for Paying Regular Taxe—Revolving Doubt Again.

The City Council met at regular session last evening with Commissioner Lester in the chair. All the members were present except Hartman.

THE PROCEEDINGS.

A petition from Angus M. Cannon and others was read, asking that East Main Street, now being repaired between Third and Fifth streets, be closed.

J. H. Birmingham asked, as they have completed the sidewalk in front of property on South Temple street between Second and Third Street, that the same be accepted and that the taxes assessed against the property be removed.

John H. Bailey having paid \$2 about two years ago an extension of water main in front of lot 15, block 16, 1st fl., and having petitioned several times to have the work done, he deserves to have a house on said lot, which cannot be done without water, said that the Council act the worth due at once. Committee on Waterworks.

A communication from Contractor Frank Harrington states that he is prepared to lay and complete sewer pipes according to his contract with the city during June 27th, 1862. Board of public works.

A petition was read from J. H. Lester asking that his property, which has been given in the dog pound be restored to him without costs as the petitioner has every way complied with the requirements of the law. Referred to the Mayor.

H. O. Hinckley sent in a bill for \$100 for sprinkling West Temple street, from Eighth Street to Temple Street, also Main Street, Eighth Street, from Ninth to Eleventh Street as per contract for the months of August and September, 1862. Requiring payment.

A petition from Hinckley, Griffith & Morris, to the City Council, stated that owing to the scarcity of hard wood in this market, they would esteem it a favor to be permitted to have the present mode of obtaining charcoal discontinued in accompanying their bill.

The request was granted, and it is ordered that it will be suspended from
