The original cause of the dis-ease is attributed to a decayed and ulcerated tooth, the trouble having communicated to the jaw-bone.

Phose interested in the Parker sect had just completed a dam across the Jordan river, near West Jordan urlidge and expected to turn the water in yesterday morning. When the men arrived at the spot, to their dismay the river had cut around one end of the dam and left their work high and dry, not only working in-jury to the stock-holders in the loss of water, but also tearing away the road at the approach of the wagon bridge. In this connection it would be proper to add that the supply had been cut off the Parker ditch by a break in the mill race, from which they received their portion hereto-fore; thus the break at presnt is doubly serious. Men and teams are at work, and probably in few days the necessary repairs will be made.
