## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**PROGRESS OF PRESIDENT YOUNG.**—We learn by Deseret Telegraph Line that President Young and party reached Tokerville from Rockville, at twenty minutes to two this afternoon. They will stop at Harrisburg to-night.

**A PARTY.**—A party will take place in the 20th Ward school-house on the evening of Monday next. It has been gotten up for the special benefit of Elder John Toone, who was called at last Conference to go to Europe on a mission. Brother Toone expects shortly to leave for the field of his missionary labors. As the coming party will be for his benefit, his friends will have an excellent opportunity of showing their good feeling towards him by attending it. We hope the party will be a success and its object be accomplished.

**CO-OPERATION.**—On the 11th of last November the Female Relief Society of the 15th Ward commenced the erection of a frame building, eighteen feet by thirty, to be used as a store for the sale of the goods manufactured by the society. Above the store is the workshop, in which the meetings of the society are held. The building, which has been put up under the direction of Mrs. Hyrum Kimball, the President of the society, is now finished, having cost about \$2,500. The Co-operative Association of the Ward having engaged the Female Relief Society to sell their goods for them at this store, it was opened last Tuesday with a stock worth about \$2,000, two of the ladies of the society acting as clerks. Thus far they have done a good business.

The Co-operative store of the Third Ward was opened on Monday last, on the premises of Mr. Ball, State Road. The following are the officers of the Association: Bishop Jacob Weiler, President; Thomas Maycock, Vice President; Peter Sinclair, John Wayman and James Eardley, Directors; W. Wagstaff, Treasurer and D. Moffat, Secretary.

The store presents a very inviting appearance to the purchasers in the Ward.

**JUDGE HAWLEY.**—The Chicago Times referring to the newly appointed associate judge for this Territory, makes the following comments:

"Mr. Cyrus M. Hawley, of this city who is Mr. Grant's nominee for associate Justice in Utah, is the law partner of Messrs. Lyman and G. Trumbull, an average lawyer and a man who has been always engaged in the interests of God and humanity. It seems to be one remarkable peculiarity of this Utah court that its Judges should always be chosen from Illinois. And another remarkable peculiarity has been that none of these Illinois Judges have been able to live in Utah very long without getting into trouble with the Mormons, and throwing up their commissions in disgust. The trouble has been that these judicial functionaries have imagined that the duties of judge include the functions of a political and moral reformer. The appointment of Mr. C. M. Hawley in no way encourages the hope that these troubles will cease."

**THIRD DISTRICT COURT.**—In the case of Baskin and De Wolfe, vs. Howard Livingston, Josiah P. Riley and W. S. Godbe, on promissory note endorsed by W. S. Godbe as surety, J. W. Kerr and C. W. Hemsted were examined for the defendant, Godbe. The testimony not being sufficient to sustain the defense, the same was abandoned and the case given to the jury to calculate the amount.

The case of Tootle, Leach & Co. vs. W. S. Godbe and J. M. Worley, was set for hearing this afternoon.

The case of B. L. Adams vs. H. A. Pine and others, in appeal from the Probate Court of Salt Lake County, the motion to dismiss the appeal, argued yesterday, was overruled, the Court ruling that appeals brought to the District Court, should be heard anew.
