Great Interest in This Afternoon's Game at the University Campus.

COLLEGE TO MEET "AGGIES."

All Hallows Team Plays Ogden High School Eleven at Junction City This Afternoon.

This is a big day in Utah football circles. The University campus in this city, and the football field at Ogden are crowded with a yelling, howling, shrieking throng of football fans. The game at the University between the "Varsity of Utah" and the team representing the Denver university, is regarded as the biggest contest of the season. Both sides are confident, to a man, of victory; and no matter which team wins it will know it has been in play of the most strenuous kind. The battle has been eagerly looked forward to for many days and the teams have trained carefully and faithfully for a long time to get in the best possible condition for the final test.

ALL HALLOWS VS. OGDEN.

The contest at Ogden between the All Hallows team of this city and the Ogden high school eleven has created a lively interest both here and in Ogden. It is predicted that the contest will be one of the best of the season, and that the game will be bitter from start to finish. The teams are evenly matched, are well trained and determined to win. The Ogden boys have been playing a remarkably fast game this year, and if the college boys are victorious they will have to play as they never did before. Captain Bassett of All Hallows declares that his team will win. The boys have been practicing hard ever since the game was arranged with the best of them which improved with each workout. The players, accompanied by a crowd of rooters, left for Ogden at 9:45 this morning on a Short Line special and will return after the game. HANLON-CORBETT BOUT.

Little Fellows Agree to Fight for Featherweight Championship in December.

New York, Oct. 30.—Eddie Hanlon, the San Francisco featherweight, will meet Young Corbett in "Frisco" for the world's championship on the night of Dec. 29, before the Hayes Valley Athletic club. Hanlon will take the place of Ben Jordan, the English champion, the change being made at the suggestion of the sporting writers of San Francisco, who suggested the telegram from the club that a match with Jordan looked too easy for Corbett. Corbett abandoned the idea of meeting Jordan and wired his acceptance of the Hanlon offer. The boys will fight at 129 pounds at 6 o'clock upon the day of the fight. The contest will be scheduled for 20 rounds and Eddy Grady will probably be selected as referee. Corbett leaves for the coast next month.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 30.—Bob Fitzsimmons has started active training for his battle with George Gardner. MARIE LAYTON CONFESSES.

Tells How She Stole Money and How She Used It Up.

New York, Oct. 31.—Marie Layton, who was arrested a few weeks ago and pleaded guilty to charges of embezzlement brought by officers of the United States Playing Card company, is reported to have made a complete confession showing that she diverted from the company's bank account \$37,000 while acting during six years as confidential clerk in the New York office. Miss Layton is now awaiting sentence. The confession was made first to Asst. Dist. Atty. Sanford and later on to Agent Kimball of the Prison association, who, under instructions from Judge Foster, is making an investigation. The woman has turned \$5,000 back to her employers, all the money she saved. In her confession she mentions the name of a prominent officer of a New York corporation, who, she says, profited by her stealings. She alleges that the man got her to cash checks and in that way she got rid of a good deal of the money. The balance went in high living.

"I got a cruise for cash," she said. "It was cash morning, noon and night. I got so that I could not walk about New York. No human being can imagine how I have suffered all these years. I knew that the day would come when I would be detected."

SCORED THE FOUR HUNDRED

Mrs. Robt. Burdette Says Smart Set is a Social Excess.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—Mrs. Robert J. Burdette, of Los Angeles, Cal., has made a scathing arraignment of the "Four Hundred" class in an address delivered before a local women's club. The "smart set" is nothing but an excess on real society, said Mrs. Burdette.

She declared that no such aggregation could ever be other than an insignificant factor in the life of a great nation.

"When asked to consider the society woman," said Mrs. Burdette, "a large proportion of the not over-thoughtful will immediately hang on the eye-line of their mental picture gallery the portrait of a chameleon-like creature that baffles recognition as she reflects the horse show, the ballroom, the street, the banquet hall, the boudoir, the automobile, as a creature that is all things to all men and nothing to any man."

DAN PATCH HAS NEVER LOST RACE.

Savage's Wonderful Animal is Regarded as King of the Turf.

THE HORSE'S SPLENDID CAREER

Only Failed to Land Two Out of a Total of Fifty-Six Heats—His Best Work.

Dan Patch, who paced the fastest mile ever traveled by a light harness horse, going over the Memphis track in 1:56 1/4, has never lost a race in his career of seven years, and, in fact, has only failed to land two out of a total of 56 heats in which he took the word from the starter. From Aug. 3, 1902, until Oct. 25, the stallion paced 13 times over 11 different tracks in eight different states in the average time of 2:00 1/4.

From the first M. E. McHenry has had charge of Dan Patch, the former being not only a wizard of the reins, but a splendid conditioner and caretaker of his charge. This season's campaign has been extremely severe, but today Dan Patch is as fresh and as robust as when he first left his stable at his owner's big stock farm near Minneapolis, Minn.

The following is a brief resume of Dan Patch's best performances on the American trotting track:

1896—Paced at Oxford, Ind., bred by D. A. Messner, Jr., owned by Joe Paton, 2:01 1/4, dam Zelma, by Wilkesboro, 2:30.
1900—Appeared first upon the turf. Won all his races (four) and made a record of 2:18.
1901—Won all his races (12), \$13,900 in stakes, and lowered his record to 2:04 1/4.
March, 1902—Purchased by M. E. Sturges, New York city, for \$30,000.
Aug. 2, 1902—Paced in 2:00 1/4 at Columbus, O.
Aug. 23, 1902—Paced in 2:00 1/4 at Reading, Mass.
Sept. 23, 1902—Paced in 1:58 1/4 at Reading, Mass.
Dec. 8, 1902—Purchased by M. W. Savage, Minneapolis, Minn., for \$60,000.
Jan. 10, 1903—Paced in 1:56 1/4 at Memphis, Tenn.
Oct. 26, 1903—Paced half mile in 1:06 and won record in 1:57 1/4.

The career of Dan Patch illustrates the possibilities of the light harness turf as never before. His dam, it is said, cost his breeder less than \$500, the service that produced him cost \$150; for his breeder he won nearly \$15,000 and sold, when five years old, for \$30,000; for M. E. Sturges, who paid \$30,000 for him, he earned at least \$15,000—probably more—and, nine years old, he is today being sold for \$60,000. And he is today but seven years old, sound and with a great future before him.

New Racing Schooner.

London, Oct. 30.—George L. Watson, the yacht designer, is estimating values for building a new racing schooner. Haste is stipulated, the intention being to have her in readiness for the transatlantic race for the cup owned by Emperor William. It is suggested that the boat is to be built for King Edward, but there is no confirmation of this. The schooner is to be owned by the new yacht is carefully guarded. The specifications and plans show that she will be an exceptionally large and powerful boat, with a 36-foot water-line and canvased to full racing trim.

MAJOR HOWSEE'S CASE.

Findings of Court-Martial Exonerate Him of Charge of Cruelty.

Washington, Oct. 30.—The war department today made public the report and findings in the case of Maj. Robert L. Howsee, charged with cruelty in the Philippines. The findings of the board exonerate Maj. Howsee, who was then lieutenant colonel commanding the district where the alleged cruelties took place. This part of the findings is approved by the war department. The second part of the findings declared that although Maj. Hunter, who made the first investigation, was unfriendly to Maj. Howsee, the investigation was fair and impartial so far as it extended. The department disapproves this portion of the findings "as contradictory in terms and unwarranted by the testimony elicited by the board during the progress of its investigation."

The whole matter was the subject of exhaustive investigation and report some months ago and, on account of the conflicting testimony, Secy. Root convened a board which met at La Grange, P. L., on July 14, and before which both Howsee and Hunter appeared.

BECHTEL MURDER CASE.

Whole Family Held as Accessories to the Crime.

Allentown, Pa., Oct. 30.—The coroner's inquest in the case of Mabel Bechtel, whose body was found in an alleyway outside her home last Tuesday morning, was concluded tonight with a verdict that the young woman's death was due to a fractured skull from a blow inflicted at her home by some person unknown to the jury. The verdict named the inmates of the house, Mrs. Katherine Bechtel, Myrtha Bechtel, John Bechtel, Charles Bechtel and Aelia Bechtel, as accessories after the fact of the crime.
