## Journeymen Painters and Paperhangers Ask for Five Cents More.

The painters and paper-hangers of this city, being unable to settle their differences with the masters have declared a strike, and it is now on. It is

hoped, however, that a settlement will be reached by the end of the week. The journeyman painters and paperhangers union, recently made a demand for an increase in the wages of painters and paperhangers from \$2.50 and \$2.75 to \$3 per day respectively, and a reduction from nine to cight hours. They were driven to this in order to abide the increase in the cost of clothing, food, fuel, house rent, etc.

Tuesday evening there was a conference between a committee from the local union consisting of President Williams and Messrs, Coombs, Thompson, Morling and Bowmen, and a committee from the masters-or employers' asso-ciation, composed of J. T. Flashman, representing the Dinwoodey Furniture company and J. H. Hamlin, T. R. Mc-Closkey and C. H. Bodell, representing
