## UTAH SURPRISED AT LOS ANGELES

St. Vincent's College Excelled Maddock's Men in Staying Qualities at the End.

## HARD GAMES STILL AHEAD.

Boulder Must Be Met at Home in Two Weeks With Small Squad of Reserves To Draw From.

Surprised and confused by the news that St. Vincent's college had taken Maddock's team into camp by a score of 11 to 3, Salt Lake football followers are today trying to account for the unexpected result of the game.

To explain the hearts of those who come to the word from Los Angeles that Utah is behaving better than the unbroken Colorado eleven that set up the "baby" cry of "robbery" some time ago down in defeat. No rumor of complaint at officials has yet reached the local campus, and the students are waiting further particulars in wonderment to learn how it happened.

After all the explanations are made, it is probable that some will take into consideration the fact that Utah played on a field where the week before, a change in the schedule of the team training for the football game was never organized that could put winning steam into two hard games in a row.

The bigger colleges utilize the squad for two occasions, relieving the big men, and saving them except in critical emergencies for the games which are the objective of the season's training.

California had been beaten by Nevada a week before meeting Stanford for Pacific Coast championship honors, and no doubt the Utah team was in a similar position when it met the Colorado eleven.

Maddock's men were forced to meet Denver, with every one of his first quality men in the lineup for the whole game, and when the game was over, Utah was crippled because the season's "one shot" had been taken.

The result was that at it always will be under conditions compelling the use of overplayed men, and Utah's problem for the rest of the season is more important than that of the rest of the season.
