He stated that there is no impedi-ment of speach or fault in the voice that cannot be overcome by practice. The best public speakers and orators, he said, are those who use simple lan-guage and brief sentences, and endeav-or to speak in a natural tone of voice. nd have natural movements of the body, and advised those who aspired to ne oators never to lose their tem-

Mr. Warde illustrated his arguments on the "Art of Oratory" by reciting in a very forcible and effective manner, parts of Shakespeare's plays. He ad-vised those who study Shakespeare to burn all the commentators on his works and study them in their pure and undefiled state. Select them, only the perfectly sound ones and pack them carefully in Jayers, placing the greenest at the bottom. They must not be massed in too deeply; but four or five layers will do no harm. Put on the sash, making sure that they Madser .Mortensen have plenty of air. If steam or mois-ture collects on the under side of the Egber glass it indicates too little ventilation, and the sash should be raised. It is well always to keep them up in daytime ex. cept in stormy or too cold days. The top fruits usually ripen first: but they should be carefully watched in order to remove any that show signs of de-cay. I have carried them in this way until late in the fall, and nearly up to winter. The cellar bottom if perfectly iry, is almost equally good; but of urse they will ripen more quickly uner the glass. I have sometimes spread them on straw, and sometimes simply spread them on the earth or cement floor. It helps them to carefully turn them over occasionally. Either way is good: but lacking either cellar or hot bed, what then? In such case simply pile the vines up like a wind row of hay and cover with straw or stalks. Some will decay: but many will ripen and saving a part is better than losing the whole. Some plow a furrow and put the vines in lengthwise and cover with straw; trenches are some-times used. Presonally I have been unable to see any advantages in the fury or trench over piling right on to of the ground. I have tried all ways with more or less uccess, but like the thed or cellar best. If ripened e vines, they should be piled trenched before there has been injury from frost, and they should never be put in while wet .- J. E. Morse in Rural News.
