## WOMAN LAIN AT REST

Grand Life and Character of Pioneer Churchman and Statesman Eulogized by Friends.

## FARMERS' INSTITUTE CAR.

Now in Junction City—S. P. Train Service Partially Restored—Fugitive Captured.

Ogden, Jan. 18.—Words of eulogy and praise were heard in an unknown train at the Ogden tabernacle yesterday afternoon during the funeral services over the remains of the late Lorin Farr.

Surviving relatives and hosts of friends of the dead assembled in the tabernacle long before the services began and many who arrived later were compelled to stand in the crowded passages of return to their homes. The building was packed from pulpit to doors with those who came to pay last tribute of respect to one of the founders of the Latter-day Saints Church and the founders of Utah.

It is safely estimated that three times the number of people were present here to obtain admittance and returned home. The funeral was probably the largest in point of attendance ever held in Ogden city. The cortege was over a half mile long. The band, accompanied seated in the tabernacle over 200 members of the family.

The pallbearers were eight of the grandsons, George, Leonard, Fred, Marcus, R. Raymond, Clement and Adam Farr and Winslow Smith. The casket was of solid mahogany and on the way to the grave was completely covered with a blanket of lilacs. The delivery service at the grave in the Ogden City cemetery were conducted by Elder John Henry Smith.

Promptly at 2 o'clock the hymn, "He was beloved by all," was sung by the tabernacle choir, following which President C. F. Middleton delivered the invocation.

The program as previously arranged was carried out with the exception of an address by Ben E. Rich who was ill. Mrs. Lucy Young Gates was substituted.

The first speaker was Elder Joseph Parry, who for nearly 60 years was an intimate friend of Lorin Farr. He told of meeting him first 54 years ago, when Elder Parry was president of the Weber case, the first president, chosen to the position by Brigham Young. He told of Elder Farr's service for 10 years as agent of Ogden without one dollar compensation. He told of his building the first mill in the county, of building the first house in Ogden, of founding Henrieville, Plain City, Hooper and other settlements, of opening up Ogden to anyone to furnish lumber for the needs of the people and for fuel. He told of his building the tabernacle and of his care of the poor. Elder Parry said he knew of no act, public or private, in the life of Lorin Farr that he would censure.

President L. W. Shurtliff, the next speaker referred to the deceased as "the Father of Weber County." He said he had known Elder Farr since 1831; always known him to stand in the front in every movement for the benefit of the people, in the building of meetinghouses and schoolhouses, and said that even at the time of his death he was a leader of the people as president of the high priests' quorum of his church.

Mrs. Susan Young Gates read an original poem, a tribute from one of the Vermont party who accompanied Elder Farr 25 years ago to Vermont to assist in the building of the monument. Elder Farr was the first of the party to die.

President Joseph F. Smith, who had known and loved Elder Farr since the latter was a boy in Nauvoo, Ill., said coming to Utah, paid a high tribute to his worth as a man, to his industry, his naturalness, his mother's wit, his practical wisdom, and said there was not a fiber in the man that held him from the path of duty. He said he had no doubt of the divine mission of Joseph Smith or the divinity of Jesus Christ.

He spoke of his living in the family of the prophet in Nauvoo and his pride in the fact that he had known the prophet and conversed with him face to face. President Smith appealed to the sons and daughters, the grandsons and great-grandsons of Lorin Farr, to take the work he had laid down, to honor his memory by providing themselves with his name, and comforted the mourners with the thought that their fathers had but gone before to prepare a place for them.

Elder David O. McKay and George A. Smith of the council of twelve, paid loving tribute to the memory of the deceased, from their long acquaintance.

Ben, Fred J. Kierulff referred to the deceased as "a great and good man." He said Lorin Farr was one of the greatest men with whom he ever came in contact. He referred to the fact that he had known him for the past of any man he ever met in Utah or elsewhere. He said he called him "father," not because he was the father of his children, but because he had been for him, he regarded him as the founder of the community, a true pioneer, a man who had earned a great name, the highest glory. He told of the important part Mr. Farr had played in establishing the era of good feeling between Mormons and Gentiles, a feeling he hoped to see extend over the entire state. He said he did not mourn for Lorin Farr, because he felt that any man was glorified in the world to come. Lorin Farr would be one of the number. He expressed deep sympathy for the relatives and endorsed the good advice given by President Smith.

He said that Lorin Farr was good, he stood every square of life in which he stood. His heart, he said, was as wide as the ocean. In all the years of his acquaintance with Elder Farr, the speaker said that he had never heard from him an unkind word. He was always cheerful and happy; always took the sunny side of the street; was always filled with hope and good cheer. He was a pathfinder, a pioneer, a patriot. He spoke of his statesmanlike his devotion, his high sense of honor, and said he had been to the prayer of his life had been to his death, and he would come back to his life and with his head erect. The benediction was pronounced by Bishop C. W. Nibley.

of the Farmers' Institute which is visiting the towns of Utah giving demonstrations of improved methods of farming and agriculture and demonstration of domestic science, arrived in Ogden yesterday morning.

The cars are loaded with specimens of horticultural and agricultural products grown in the state and a number of exhibits from the State Agricultural college at Logan. One of the cars is filled up as a lecture room with a curtain upon which are shown photographs of views of farm life which is used to advantage by the lecturer in explaining the best methods now in vogue on the farms of the country. The other car contains a full equipment used by Mrs. R. E. Maycock in her lectures and demonstrations on domestic science.

The lecture department is in charge of Superintendent L. A. Merrill. Farmers of Weber county are requested to attend the demonstrations which are being held today. At 2 o'clock this afternoon a demonstration of milking cows by the improved mechanical device for that purpose will be given.

Arrangements are being made for a lecture to be held in some hall in this city tonight.

The car contains an assortment of grasses and seeds, and other horticultural and agricultural products of the state with specimens of injurious and beneficial insects found in the state.

Demonstrations and lectures were given at Willard Saturday. Tuesday morning the party will leave for Morgan and according to the itinerary Salt Lake City will be reached January 26.

## TRAIN SERVICE RESTORED.

All through passenger trains on the Southern Pacific which have been deputed west over the San Pedro Route are now being sent over the Southern Pacific line as far as Roseville and then diverted over the Shasta Route, an electric line, to Sacramento, thence to San Francisco.

Overland Limited No. 1, was the first train to take these orders yesterday, and other trains are being sent over this route until the damage on the Southern Pacific line is repaired. Several trains running far behind the schedules from the west came into Ogden over the San Pedro Route last night but beginning today the Shasta and Southern Pacific routes will be followed.

Another Pioneer Called.

Fairview Will Celebrate Semi-Centennial—District Court at Maui.

The funeral was held yesterday at the South ward meetinghouse.

DEATH OF MRS. ANNIE HUGHES.

Fine Opera House Nearing Completion—Painful Accident.

Mrs. Hughes was born Feb. 16, 1827, at Lanesville, England; came to Utah in 1850 from Council Bluffs, Iowa, and settled in Centerfield, Utah; was an early settler in Silver Reef, where she was well known as a successful nurse. After the death of her husband, John R. Hughes, about 1880, she went to Salt Lake to her daughter, Mrs. Wm. T. Lynch. About eight years ago she made her home here, with her son, Chas. H. Embley, who lived in Salt Lake City. The funeral being held in the Seventh-day Adventist church, at 10 o'clock, her son, Chas. H.
