NO EXCUSE FOR SUCH COURSE

Hillsboro, O., Sept. 18 .- With Senator Foraker as orator of the day, the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of this city was celebrated today. In the course of his oration, Senator Foraker said:

"There is now abroad in the land, and has been for the last two or three years, widespread and dangerous sense not only of impatience with the restraints or the Constitution, but of positive pur-pose to disregard, violate and over-intow them if they cannot be otherwise evaded. "No greater estamity could befall this

No greater calamity could befall this atry than for it to so change its sulfution as to authorize the federal manufation as to autorize the federal perminent to deal with all or with any maiderable part of the subjects over hich states reserved control. The any powers of the federal government inferred directly and by implication to al with national and international af-ics call for more legislation than it is fairs call for more legislation than it is possible for the Congress to carefully consider, thoroughly debate and prop-erly enact. Washington, Sept. 18 .- Canners Washington, Sept. 18.—Canners of food were here today before the board of food and drug inspection against the regulation and enforcement of the food and drug act which provides that the rules in regard to labels shall go in effect after Oct. 1 next. The regulation provides that after

in effect after Oct. 1 next. The regulation provides that after that date the principal label on the can shall state the substance of the pro-duct and the name of the place of manufacture. This regulation has been extended from time to time and can-ners now want a further extension. Canners represented at the hearing today asserted that they had half a million dollars' worth of labels on hand, which will be worthless if the regulation becomes effective at this time. These concerns declared the law to be confiscatory. The board will submit its recommendations to the law to be confiscatory. Fra-ker, saying he had decided that an in-quest would develop nothing. Three days ago, the coroner stopped the fun-eral arrangements, saying he was not days ago, the coroner stopped the fan-eral arrangements, saying he was not satisfied with Fraker's elatemeinits that O'Neal had died of Bright's dis-oase. The physician said he had cared for O'Neal since the latter's arrival from Evansville, III., where he had been an inimate in a hospital. Claude O'Neal, a brother of the dead evangelist, came here from Great Bend, Wash, to inves, thrate the circumstances surrounding Cyrll's death. Today he said he was satisfied that O'r Fraker had acted solay the part of a friend. Dr. Fraker, 10 years ago, created a sensation by disappearing after insuring his life for \$75,000. He was supposed to have been drowned, but later he was found living in the Minnesota woods.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 18.—Tho an-nual meeting of the stockholders of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company, rhinderphia reals at Transit company, which controls all the street car lines of this city, was held today. The an-nual report submitted by President Parnon showed a deficit from the year's operations of \$364,042, compared with a surplus of \$366,042, compared with a surplus of \$366,266 in the preceding 12 months. The gross carnings exceeded a surplus of \$103.996 in the preceding 12 months. The gross earnings exceeded \$18,000,000, the largest in the company's history. President Eursons, in his re-port, stated that in the last 12 months \$1,217.596 was paid out in payment of claims, an increase of \$203,666 over tha previous year. The percentage of earn-ings required for the purpose has in-creased in 10 years from 2% or 3 to about 7, or equivalent to a dividend of \$12 a share on stock. 12 a share on stock
